

### MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING OF SCRA, MARCH 5, 1986

Elected officers present: President George Shedore KS6W, Vice President Bob Olsten WD6DPE, Secretary Marie Mappus N6KUS, Treasurer Ed Goei KA5LGC, Member at Large Warren Klinger WB6RHP, Repeater Chairman Phil Copenhauver N6KZS, Short Skip Editor Al Bloom N1AL.

Visitors present: Jack Osborne K6LVD Santa Rosa, Sid Chodun W8UP (Michigan) Sant Rosa, Greg Maxey KB6EQ Marin. New Calls: Pam Bender KB6LVI (N). Upgrade: Sarah Davis N6FAX (G). In attendance: 56.

The General Meeting of the SCRA was called to order by the President, George Shedore KS6W, at 7:38 p.m.

The guest speaker was Bob Smith NA6T, the ARRL Section Manager for the San Francisco Section, from Fort Bragg who spoke to the group about Amateur Radio in Public Service. He presented the meeting with the question "Why have Amateur Radio Emergency Communications?" He then showed a video cassette film entitled "Any Moment". This was an amateur radio and disaster preparedness film prepared by Jerry Boyd. He stated volunteers are the life blood of any organization and are vital in assisting the various emergency organizations.

The new RACES officer for Sonoma County, Jim WB6PER, spoke about the recent disaster in the County and said that there were 127 persons involved in the emergency and that 95 were RACES members. He congratulated the Hams on their responding to the emergency and giving their assistance. He also spoke about the need for a training program and for more equipment. Jim requested comments about the operation from those present. Relatively few comments were forthcoming. The principal concern of the membership centered upon how the amateurs' participation could and should have been more readily recognized by the media.

The minutes of the last General Meeting were approved as published in Short Skip. The motion being made by Warren WB6RHP and seconded by Doug WAØJRB.

George KS6W again reminded the club that we need a Public Service Chair for the March of Dimes Walkathon.

Phil N6KZS told the group that the new repeater was in need of a controller before it could be put into service. He informed tha Club that the type of controller decided upon by the Board was an RC-85. The Club unanimously voted to accept the Board's recommendation and to purchase the new controller which will cost about \$1000.

Net Control operator for the club net for March will be Susan N6IRJ. Russ N6KMJ reported that there were 10 students in the Novice Class and that they were very enthusiastic.

Don Boosinger KD6HQ, the Homebrew Chair, made a correction to the number of points assigned to item #5. It should have been 20 instead of 21. Jim Boyette WN6D, Terry Laduke WA6RNF, and Jay Horn N6DZU will assist with the judging.

The April guest speakers will be Rich Freitas KA6SSL and Larry Rau KS6WV. They will discuss their experiences in Guerneville during the recent flood.

Al NIAL discussed the cost of offset printing, pointing out that it costs \$74.82 an issue for 6 pages of Short Skip. It will average about \$110 more a year for the offset rather than the mimeograph method of printing.

Winner of the club drawing was Tracy WB6TMY.

George KS6W extended apologies to the club for not having the dues structure approved prior to this date. The dues were continued at the same rate as last year, with the exception that only new hams would have their dues prorated at the time of their joining the club. Dues will not be prorated for other hams. The motion was approved by Doug WAØJRB and seconded by May N6GZV.

The club was further informed by George KS6W that the budget as published in Short Skip was incorrect and that a corrected and balanced budget would appear in the next issue of Short Skip.

OLD BUSINESS: George KS6W informed the club that the County had spent \$5000 to purchase a GE Master II. They have at this time 32 other repeaters in operation throughout the County and have trained crews to keep these repeaters in operation. This is a tremendous resource to the club. During the emergency the "91" repeater was out of commission, however "73" remained in operation.

The club has been assured by Pete Peterka that the County will do its utmost to have the new repeater in operation 10 days after the receipt of a controller.

George KS6W expressed a desire to increase the membership and hoped that the new repeater with its increased operating capabilities will encourage other hams to join. Some of the members expressed their opinions that the autopatch should be used for emergency purposes only, while others felt that the club members should have access to the autopatch for personal calls. It was decided to get the repeater into operation first and then determine the use of the autopatch at a later date.

NEW BUSINESS: Al NIAL presented the club with a number of recommendations that he felt should be included in the changes of the Constitution. Since it was getting late, Al NIAL made a motion to suspend Robert's Rules of Order and to make the changes to the Constitution as they were presented in Short Skip. The motion was approved by Kathi WB6UAZ and seconded by Russ N6KMJ.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m. The motion to adjourn was made by Warren WB6RHP and seconded by Bill WD6DXW.

#### FROM THE

#### PRESIDENT'S

#### DESK

After monitoring the repeater for many years and listening to many QSO's, I find that there is a serious lack of proper operating procedures being used.

If this trend continues, we will have another CB band on our hands. Whatever happened to the days when you enjoyed listening to the repeater for interesting QSOs about rigs, antennas, HF contacts made, public service events, swap meets, etc.

What happened to the days when if we wanted to have a long chat with someone, we always called them on the repeater and then took them off to a simplex frequency where we talked to our hearts content about anything and never really forced other people to listen to idle chit chat? Remember, the repeater has excellent coverage, and many thousands of people, not only in Sonoma Co., listen to our machine.


I have taught many Novices the theory and code to pass their Novice test, and one of the principles I taught was proper CW practices: The pride of having a good "fist", listening before transmitting, & proper operating practice. Unfortunately, no such training is available for the Technician just getting on two meters - he has to learn by listening to how other people conduct themselves and emulate them as a start. Unfortunately, some of the people he listens to are not using good practices. As a result, he gets off to a bad start.

He blindly thinks he is doing fine, and the nature of the older hams is such that they don't want to offend the newcomer by correcting him on the air. The result is the new repeater user establishes poor operating practices, confidently believing he is a good operator.

I don't know how many times I have been told "oh, when so and so is on the air, I just turn off my (Continued next page)

REPEATER OPERATING PRACTICES
Adapted from ARRL Repeater Directory

- 1. Monitor the repeater to become familiar with any peculiarities in its operation.
- 2. To initiate a contact, simply indicate that you are on frequency. Do not call "CQ". Various regions have different practices on making yourself heard, but generally, "This is WlAW monitoring" will suffice.
- 3. Identify legally; you must ID at the end of a transmission or series of transmissions and at least once each 10 minutes during the QSO.
- 4. Pause between transmissions. This allows other hams to use the repeater. (Someone may have an emergency.) On the '73 repeater, you must let the squelch "tail" drop to reset the timer.
- 5. Keep transmissions short and thoughtful. Your monologue may prevent someone with an emergency from using the repeater. If your transmission is long enough, you may "time out" the repeater. You are being heard by many listeners in cluding non-hams with "public service band" scanners. Don't give a bad impression of our service.
- 6. Use simplex whenever possible. If you can complete your QSO on a direct frequency, there is no need to tie up the repeater and prevent others from using it.
- 7. Use the minimum amount of power necessary to maintain the QSO. This FCC regulation [97.67(a)] minimizes the chances of accessing distant repeaters on the same freq.
- 8. Don't break into a contact unless you have something to add. Interrupting is no more polite on the air than it is in person.
- 9. Repeaters are intended pri marily to facilitate mobile operation. During commuter rush hours, base stations should relinquish the repeater to mobile stations. Some repeater groups have rules that specifically address this practice.
- 10. Many repeaters are equipped with autopatch facilities which, when properly accessed, connect the repeater to the telephone system to (Continued next page)

provide a public service. The FCC forbids using an autopatch for anything that could be construed as business communications. Nor should an autopatch be used to avoid a toll call. Do not use an autopatch where regular telephone service is available. Autopatch privileges that are abused may be rescinded.

11. All repeaters are assembled and maintained at considerable expense and inconvenience. Usually an individual or a group is responsible, and those who are regular users of a repeater should support the efforts of keeping the repeater on the air.

### AUTOPATCHING TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS & OTHER EMERGENCIES (Guidelines developed with the CHP by the W6FNO/R Repeater)

Common sense should govern your decision on what to report. Remember, when reporting a problem, provide the following data:

1) A description of the problem.

2) Location of the problem. (Get it before you make the call.) Use the next off-ramp as a reference or use a call box number.

3) Are there any injuries?

4) Identify yourself: This is an Amateur Radio Operator. My name is...

When reporting a problem, be aware of the following:

- Freeway traffic lanes are numbered from the lane closest to the center, which is lane number 1.
- The painted island that guides traffic on or off the freeway is 2) called the "gore point". [For obvious reasons]
- 3) A vehicle is not on a shoulder or center divider unless it is completely out of a traffic lane.

With these points in mind, consider the following situations and the appropriate response on the part of the Amateur Radio operator reporting the situation:

OBJECTS IN ROADWAY: Will it dissipate by itself? A cardboard box, glass or even nails will be long gone by the time a police unit can arrive on the scene. Report the following as nonemergency traffic: bricks, rocks, other immovable objects.

LIVE ANIMALS: The freeway is a limited-access area. Live animals should be reported, particularly if located on the center divider.

DEAD ANIMALS: If the animal is the size of a medium-sized dog or larger, it should be reported as a hazard (not an emergency). Anything smaller will disappear quickly.

STRANDED MOTORISTS: Look for a tag on the vehicle; this indicates that police have noted the problem and summoned aid. If the vehicle is on the right shoulder where call boxes are available, don't make the call. If it is night-time and the driver is female, or if the vehicle is on the center divider, make the call.

ACCIDENTS: Report accidents if there are injuries or lanes blocked. Don't report accidents that look "old" or if persons are exchanging names. Don't stop unless instructed to by a police officer.

DRUNK DRIVER: Don't get involved. Don't follow or stay with a vehicle. Police do not want Amateur Radio operators involved in this type of call.

HIT AND RUN: Do not pursue the vehicle. Get a description of the vehicle or the license number.

AAA SERVICE: Don't stop on the freeway to render aid. Call AAA directly if the problem is off the freeway. Get the number from the directory or directory assistance.

The quickest way to obtain aid for a fire emergency FIRE EMERGENCY: is to call the fire agency directly ["911" in Sonoma County]. cases, a call to the appropriate county fire department will result in the request being routed to the correct local agency faster than by calling police first.

Always remember that your function is to observe and report. Never become involved in pursuit, investigation or other law-enforcement action. These are the responsabilities of the police. Do not endanger yourself in any way.

I think it seems pretty obvious that we made a good showing of emergency communications during the flood. There is some unhappiness about the lack of coverage by the press of our part in the incident. I think it would be healthy for us to remember that we did not volunteer to get our names in the paper, we volunteered to provide communications to help people in need. I believe it is our responsability,

not the newspaper's, to figure out how to get recognition and community support. This is one of the programs being planned now. It will take some time and politics, but it's still up to us to make the most out of what we do.

Since the flood incident, there has been a lot of talk and questions about training. There is little doubt that training and practice make a better operator. A training program is being put together now and will start immediately. I suddenly discover that I need more training than anybody about everything. Who is going to train me, and to do what? When I looked in the mirror and asked myself this question, it didn't take me long to come up with the obvious answer: training starts at home. If I sit around on my hands & wait for the training gods to arrive, the next disaster may beat them here. I have some suggestions for myself and for us all.

We all have radio habits that now and again need to be reexamined. These habits seem to be built into the microphone. We pick up the mike, and our habits come tumbling out. Let's all take a fresh look at our personal operating procedure and see if it needs a new sound. A good place to start is with the Operators Handbook from ARRL. Training is everybody's responsability, all the time. Let's not wait until the chips are down before we think about how to pick them up.

Training comes in a lot of different forms. It it generally agreed that contesting is an excellent training technique. Equipment and antenna set-up, pressure operating, and record keeping are involved. All of these things became important during the flood and will again on the next incident. If you want training, plan on getting in on the VHF contest planned for the top of Sonoma Mountain and give Field Day a second thought. The CDF/VIP program will have summer training and RACES will also

CDF/VIP program will have summer training and RACES will also.

Jump on the next training program that happens to be coming by. Don't wait around for the big one with donuts and coffee, you may be out of town that day.

It will take us all working together and supporting the plan (whatever that is) to make RACES take on the new look that the RACES Board of Directors and I were appointed to do. The RACES "Complaint Department" has been closed, the new sign on the door reads "Creative Suggestions and Volunteer Sign-ups".

### IMPRESSIONS OF THE 1986 CALIFORNIA FLOOD

It is possible that many people were not able to monitor the work and the performance of the amateurs in this latest flood, so I am going to write my impressions of the fine work done by the Amateurs...

This is about two groups out of the many that also did a very fine and necessary job. I mainly monitored the initial group on 146.730 MHz and the Santa Rosa/Guerneville evacuation coordination group on 145.250 MHz. Communication traffic was so active that sometimes the time period for messages was 45 seconds. There were times it appeared the communication group was the coordinator that assured everything happened in the correct time framework. Things like priority transportation for victims needing medical care and having an ambulance waiting for their quick transportation to the hospital... Having people ready to board the helicopters when they arrived. Keeping track of the locations of the helicopters, busses, people, ambulances, and supplies that were supposed to come.

There were more than 100 hams involved in this flood, and many had to drive through the flooded highways and back roads to be able to arrive at the communications centers manned by the amateurs. Some stayed working for more than 48 hours at a time. When many of them did leave, they left their personal equipment behind for use by the other volunteers. They had problems of shortage of water, blankets, sleeping bags, food, disinfectant, batteries, toilets, and information.

The outstanding impression I had was the professionalism maintained... I myself was very active in the 1956 Yuba City flood as Director of Communications for the California Wing Civil Air Patrol, so I had a good yardstick of personal experiences to form my impressions.

ARRL TO FCC: RECONSIDER PACKET RADIO ARRL has petitioned FCC to exempt digipeaters from third-party traffic prohibitions. (ARRL)

FCC TO ARRL: "OK". In response to ARRL's Petition, FCC has TEMPORARILY waived restrictions on third party traffic thru digipeaters operating above 50 MHz using the AX.25 (or compatible) protocol. All traffic must be originated at a station under local control [see 97.3(m)]. Digipeaters must implement devices & procedures to ensure compliance with the rules when the control op is not present, [see 97.80(a)]. The waiver is issued pending Commission action on ARRL and others' petitions.(ARRL)

EXTRA CLASS CERTIFICATES are no onger being issued by FCC. You can get one from ARRL, however. Send \$3 & a photocopy of your license.(ARRL)

CITITATIONS FOR SWAP NET operation (Florida Trader's Net) were recently issued to 20 Florida hams. Details are still sketchy, but some of those cited were on every week, & FCC may have considered them "in the biz." W5YI suggests that until FCC rules what is and is not legal, don't give out prices over the air. (W5YI)
