

MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING OF SCRA, May 7, 1986

Elected officers present: President George Shedore KS6W, Vice Pres. The General Meeting of the SCRA was called to order by the President, George Shedore KS6W, at 7:35 PM.

The guest speaker for the evening was Rich Freitas KA6SSL. about the Civil Air Patrol, how the CAP came into being, their role in patrolling the Atlantic and Pacific coasts searching for submarines during World War II, how they help with emergency operations and their work with the Red Cross during disasters.

Ron Pipes WB6NBR offered the REDX Field Day challenge to the club. He proposed that the REDX Club operate 20 hours, with 3 transmitters and 10 operators. They will be located at Burdell Peak in Novato. accepted the challenge. The SCRA will have no limitations on time, transmitters or operators. The outcome of the challenge will be awaited with anticipation. Who will be the winner: SCRA or REDX ???

Bill requested that hams in the area volunteer to listen to the marine bands and relay messages to his father in Santa Rosa while he is on an extended cruise from Canada to Mexico and various points in the Pacific. A letter from the Canadian Minister of Communications informed SCRA that there is no problem with bringing amateur radios into Canada. There is a reciprocal agreement between both counries. However, the radios must

be operated in accordance with US FCC operating privileges.

Ed KA5LGC gave the Treasurer's report for April. The net income was \$145.26. The General Fund has a balance of \$1039 and the Repeater Fund \$1462. One half of the Club's first quarter dues were deposited to the Repeater account in April. Bill WD6DXW made the motion to approve the It was seconded by Phil N6KZS.

Phil N6KZS stated that the Novice class had 6 new Novice licensees. The class will continue for another 4 weeks working for "on the air"

experience.

Kathi WB6UAZ stated that a dinner will be given by the City of Santa Rosa in recognition of the efforts of local hams during the recent disaster. Announcements of club meetings have been placed in the various

Jim WB6PER reminded tha club that there is a RACES net the 1st and 3rd Mondays of each month. He asked the members listening to give suggestions on how the net could be imporved. He said he would also offer his own

suggestions.

A letter was received from the March of Dimes expressing their appreciation for the assistance of the hams during the recent Walkathon.

The hams will participate in the upcoming Rose Parade on Sat. May 17. There will be a net on '73 on Friday for all hams participating in the Parade. They will also meet for a free breakfast the morning of the

parade for last-minute instructions.

The Homebrew Contest winner was Brian KE6WL. His name was added to the plaque in the trophy case. He will receive a Certificate of Appreciation.

Al NIAL informed the club that Short Skip has obtained additional advertisers and that the new electronics firm HSC had paid for the printing and mailing of the last issue of Short Skip. It was sent to all hams in the County. Hoppy WD6CKP, Kermit KB6GBV, Bob WD6DPE, and John W6CCY all assisted in the mailing of this issue. The club made a \$100 profit on this issue.

The winner of the membership raffle was Brian N6IIY. He was #16 on the list and won \$16.

Al NIAL will again be in charge of the Flea Market activities in September.

Field Day is near. John W6CCY will be unable to set up the antennas this year. Someone is needed to take over this responsibility as well as the job of picking up the antennas, obtaining names for various operating positions, determining bands, etc.

Phil N6KZS reported that the Repeater Committee prepared a questionnaire to find out the desires of the club on certain items regarding the use of the Repeater. The main issues were whether or not the club wanted a voice or code identification signal, and how to determine the use of the autopatch. The County is willing to pay for autopatch charges. The club was cautioned about the possibility of losing this option if abuses were made in the use of the autopatch. As a result of the questionaire, a CW identification, an open autopatch, and an Smeter readback were approved.

The raffle raised \$55 for the club.

The proposed changes in the Constitution and By-laws as submitted by George KS6W and as printed in Short Skip were discussed at length pro and con. The motions and the results of the votes were as follows:

Motions 1 and 2: Remove Article X from the club Constitution along with all references to the Repeater Fund in the Bylaws. All club money to be combined into one account, with the repeater expenditures to be budgeted along with other items at the beginning of the year. These motions would also delete a provision in Article X that the Board must get club approval for any expenditures over a certain amount.

Defeated by hand count 21-17.

Motion #3 requires that the Board decide on a budget for each year. Approved by voice vote.

Motion #4 changes the Repeater and Activities Chairmen from elected to appointed positions. Approved by voice vote.

Warren WB6RHP made a motion to adjourn the meeting. It was seconded by Phil N6KZS. The meeting adjourned at 10:15 PM.

FIELD DAY JUNE 28/29

"Be there or be square."

This year everybody who wants to operate will get a chance. We plan to have as many transmitters as we can get equipment and antennas for. The "hot" bands (80M at nite and 40M & 20M in the day) will be manned by the "hot shot" operators, but we hope to have simultaneous operation on phone and CW on at least some bands with lots of opportunity for all to get their feet wet.

We will need lots of help to set up all the ANTENNAS. We'll start at 8 AM Saturday morning. We want to have several stations ready to go when the contest begins at 11 AM.

Responsibility for specific BANDS is: N1AL 80M, KD6GC 40M, W2EBG 20M, KS6W Novice coord. Warren WB6RHP will again bring his 50 ft trailer-mounted tower. We've got two masts of about 50-60 ft for the 80 meter antennas, and we'll have John W6CCY's beams for the high bands. Logs will be provided courtesy of WA8LLY, and publicity by WB6UAZ.

A FIRLD DAY MRETING will precede the Board meeting Tues June 17 at 7 PM. For anyone who wants to come, we'll do FD first so you don't have to sit through the Board meeting.

Coming down Hiway 101 from the North, take the Hiway 116 exit in Cotati. Go West about 1.5 miles and turn left on Mecham Rd. After 4 miles, turn right on Pepper Rd. In another 3 miles Pepper Rd ends: Turn right on Petaluma - Valley Ford Rd. Two Rock is about 1 mi. on the left.





NEW NOVICE PRIVILEGES have been proposed by FCC. New frequencies include 28.2-28.5 with phone allowed above 28.3, 220-225 MHz with a 25 Watt max power limitation, 1246-1260 MHz (5 Watts). Repeater operation on the 220/1246 bands would be OK. The Novice exam would be expanded to address the new privileges, and exam procedures would be tightened. Complete details in June QST. (ARRL)

COORDINATED REPEATERS are supported but not required by FCC. When two repeaters interfere, both are responsible to resolve the problem. If one is coordinated, but the other is not, the non-coordinated repeater has primary responsibility for

resolving the interference.

Freq. coordinators may 1) deny coordination requests in congested bands, 2) set aside frequencies for certain modes, 3) limit antenna SOVIET HAMS RISKED PRISON to tell the height and power, and 4) require sub-audible tone access.

Section 97.67 of the rules, regulating antenna height and power has been deleted -- this will be left up to the Coordinators. (ARRL)


