





There will be a Tuesday night net survey to get an idea of those interested in coming to the picnic.


The next board meeting will be at Lyle's house on July 18 at 7:30

SCRA PICNIC AUGUST 15




P.S. We would like to reserve the parking near the house for our handicapped members. There's lots of parking in the field, look for the balloons at the gate.

The meeting was called to order at 7:35 by President, Connie Freitas N6FYV.

Connie N6FYV announced that the August meeting will be held in conjunction with the club picnic at WA8LLY Steve's home. Connie also announced that Russ N6KMJ was in the hospital recovering from surgery.

Phil N600A introduced the guest speakers, Bob K6QXY and Al WA6MXI, who gave a very interesting and informative presentation on moonbounce.

Warren WB6RHP made a motion to approve the minutes as presented in Short Skip with the correction in the spelling of two names. seconded by Terry WA6RNF.

Phil N600A made a motion to approve the Treasurer's report as printed

This was seconded by Terry WA6RNF.

Doug WW6D and Steve WA8LLY reported on the Field Day contest between SCRA and REDX. REDX won with a total of 2475 contacts. The SCRA made 1112 contacts. The contest plaque will be engraved and given to REDX at the Christmas party. Field Day was not well attended this year. Only 12 hams operated and 38 attended the outing.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Hoppy WD6CKP stated that the autopatch was still not working properly, and that they are at present unable to determine the cause of the problem. Steve WA8LLY asked for volunteers to teach a Novice class in September. There is a waiting list of people who would like to attend. He also stated that people at Field Day expressed an interest in taking a Novice

class. Joel WB6PDP is still teaching Novices and has twelve people in class at present.

Bob WD6DPE reported on the June RACES meeting. The training committee is going ahead with plans to hold a training session sometime the latter part of September or early October. They would like to obtain classrooms and an auditorium in a school for the project. There would be various sections and the attendees would rotate between the various sections.

SEBASTOPOL

Disaster test for 'hams'

Sonoma County "hams" will demonstrate their radios under simulated emergency conditions Saturday and Sunday at Ragle Ranch Park, part of a national amateur radio field day.

In an emergency, the only method of communication might be amateur radio. Russ O'Neill, vice president of Sonoma County Radio Amateurs, said ham radio was the first communication out of Mexico City during the September 1986 earthquake.

Because they will be simulating a disaster situation, amateur radio operators will not be permitted to use any commercially produced power. Operators must rely on solar power, batteries and gas-powered generators.

"You'll see some extraordinary monstrosities go up," O'Neill said.

Under nationally determined rules, operators may begin erecting antennae and setting up emergency power devices at 10 a.m. They may start broadcasting by code or radiotelephone at noon and continue for 24 hours. The public is welcome to attend.



It was open, but we had no operators available to take advantage of the situation. What a great experience you Novices and Technicians missed.

The new dupe sheets improved the duping problem of last year. Even the worst logs had less than 3% dupes. The llx17 sheets were a bit unwieldly in that Pacific breeze we had.

APPRECIATION NOTES


The following are two excerpts from the July 1987 issue of the Santa Rosa Cycling Club newsletter:

NEWS of Amateur Radio

AN ANGRY FCC OFFICIAL demanded the ARRL top brass come to his office. He wanted them to explain all the heat FCC has been getting on Docket 87-14, FCC's attempt to take 2 MHz of the 220 MHz band from Amateurs. An "always reliable source" told Westlink Report about the supposedly secret meting between Thomas P. Stanley, head of FCC's Office of Engineering and Technology and ARRL Washington Liason WlUED, General Counsel N3AKD, and President W4RA. The atmosphere at the meeting was described as "less than friendly."

Reply comment deadline on docket 84-14 has been extended to July 31.

PACKET MESSAGES BY SATELLITE are now a reality with the successful testing of the Japanese "Fuji" satellite. 8JlJAS is now QRV with a reduced BBS capability due to hardware problems. Max memory for message storage is 192K.

2 NEW RUSSIAN SATELLITES LAUNCHED June 23. RS-10 and RS-11 have identical orbits but different frequencies in the 10 and 2 meter bands. The low earth orbit of 1000 kM should assure stable orbits for several decades at least.





IT DOESN'T: Bite you, bark or meow, leave deposits on your property, piddle on your trees, nor does it dig up and scatter garbage.



LOCAL HAMS SET RECORD

Two Sonoma County HP engineers, Bob Dildine W6SFH and sometime SCRA member Glenn Elmore N6GN have broken the world land distance record on 10 GHz. At 6:46 AM Sunday July 19, a two-way CW QSO was completed between Mt Frazier (8000 ft) in the South San Joaquin Valley and Ball Rock (6700 ft) at the Northwest end of the Sacramento Valley, a distance of 414 miles. The homebrew rigs put out 1/4 Watt on 10368.0003 MHz to 4 foot dishes. Signal levels were S4.

A half-dozen stations from San Diego to the Sacramento Valley participated in the test. Signal levels peaked at over 30 dB over the noise levels during portions of the session. For weeks, they have been checking out signal paths by "remote control" using two meter packet radio digipeaters. They used both packet and 2 meter SSB for coordination during the test.
