

RG-62A/U has a velocity factor of .86, so 1/2 wavelength at the center of each band is:


ARRL VEC EXAM CHANGES IN 1989 by Steve Lund WASLEY

Several changes are being made to the ARRL VEC Amateur Radio exam program in 1989. The first is that the cost will be \$4.75.

Of more significance for most examinees are the changes to the code exams. These will be approximately 8 1/2 minutes long. This is to make more material for the 10 fill-in-the-blank questions. You can still pass by 1 minute of solid copy. The QSO format has been changed somewhat. If you've memorized the old format, you will be in for a surprise. If you are copying solidly, you will have no problem with the new format.

The other change is that ARRL exam materials will be stocked locally. This means exams may be given more frequently. Anyone who has been to one of the previous exam sessions knows that the CW test sessions have run over the alloted time. About 3/4 of the examinees are upgrading to Technician only and have had to wait at least a half hour for the CW exams to be completed. If I can round up the required 3 examiners, I would prefer to give the CW exams whenever you are ready to upgrade. This could possibly be before the monthly SCRA meeting.

I plan to have at least 4 test sessions in 1989 -- February, May, September and December. Two will be night sessions and the others will be on Saturday, unless other times would be more convenient.



Typical 1930's station de K6VHP. (Tnx RAIN)



BOOK REVIEW:

THE ARRL OPERATING MANUAL



The ARRL seems to be in the midst of a major upgrade of the entire line of League publications. We reviewed the new, greatly expanded, Handbook last month. The new Operating Manual is as big as the Handbook was 3 or 4 years ago!

As an "old timer" (20 years a ham) who has tried nearly every band and mode at one time or another, I didn't think there would be much new for me to learn from this book.

My opinion changed as I read the very first chapter, Shortwave Listening by Dave Newkirk AK7M. This chapter alone would be worth the price of the book for a serious Short-Wave Listener (SWL). Dave starts with an overview of the various radio services. Then he "Steps through the Megahertz" band-by-band from 9 kHz to 30 MHz, with detailed descriptions of what there is to hear, down to individual stations in many cases. This is not a dry catalog, however -- it is presented from a real enthusiast's perspective, with hints on where to find rare DX such as "tropical" and pirate broadcasters. Other information is also included, such as addresses of the major SWL periodicals and hints on how to pry out that rare QSL card.

The Amateur Radio Spectrum chapter is much more than just a listing of the ham bands: there's 72 pages of text and tables. It covers ITU (WARC) and FCC/NTIA allocation procedures, voluntary band plans, repeater frequency coordination, and lists of beacons.

Basic Operating covers all you need to know to get started, from basic phone and CW operating skills to how to locate a local Amateur Radio club and how to build and test a simple antenna.

Believe it or not, there's an entire chapter on Antenna Orientation! It describes 4 ways to determine true North, use of azimuthal maps, and a short BASIC program to determine bearing, given latitude and longitude. Lat. and Long. are tabulated for over 500 cities worldwide, listed by callsign prefix. 21 pages of azimuthal (great-circle) maps are printed in the Reference section: Surprise your next DX contact when you instantly tell him the reverse bearing to your QTH!

The chapter on **DX'ing** is by Bob Locher W9KNI author of the very popular book *The Complete DX'er*. This chapter is written in the same style as the book: a "you are there" narrative of a typical operating session on each band. He also covers propagation-predicting techniques, most needed countries (by region), DX contesting, and QSL'ing.

Ever hanker to go on a **DXpedition?** A 17-page chapter covers everything you need to know, from deciding where to go, to lists of AC voltages and plug styles in over 150 foreign countries.

Contests get 57 pages written by long-time contester Clarke Greene KlJX. Several duping and logging programs are included.

The Operating Awards chapter includes information on virtually every award available worldwide, with large, FULL-COLOR reproductions of 95 of them!

Chapters on RTTY, Packet Radio, FM and Repeaters, VHF/UHF, Satellites, Emergency Communications, Traffic Handling, and Image Communications (ATV, SSTV, FAX) cover these subjects in excruciating detail.

The Reference section is incredible! In its 240 pages you will find the ARRL Countries list, callsign prefix cross references, 17 pages of prefix maps, application forms for ARRL awards, CQ zone map, US counties list, worldwide sunrise/sunset times by prefix for all 12 months of the year (96 pages), ARRL field organization, azimuthal maps, and 53 pages of propagation charts.

Cost of the ARRL Operating Manual, 3rd Edition, is \$15.00. ARRL publications are available at HSC Electronics (see ad) and at Sawyer's newstand on 4th St.

EWS of Amateur Radio

ARRL FILES ON FCC RULES RE-WRITE. Our own Director Rod Stafford KB6ZV was on the 4-man committee preparing the response. ARRL's biggest complaint was a shift away from "due process" to greater FCC authority. ARRL submitted its own version, totalling 17,045 words, compared to FCC's 24.397. Currently. Part 97 runs to 30,073 words. (Westlink)

THE "MEDIA" FILE ON RULES RE-WRITE. A group representing nearly all broadcast and many print media filed a 23-page comment prepared by a high-powered Washington law firm. Their main concern is to eliminate the requirement that any media use of Amateur Radio in disasters must be "critical to immediate protection of life and/or property." (W5YI)

NO CODE AGAIN? A new organization, the "National Amateur Radio Assoc." (NARA) has been formed by 50 people, mostly involved with Amateur Radio publishing, under the leadership of Fred Maia, publisher of the W5YI Report. They propose a no-code license with VHF/UHF-only privileges (no 2 meters). No homebrew transmitters would be allowed. The test would emphasize good operating practices and, to a lesser extent, electronic theory. (Westlink)

The ARRL Executive Committee appointed a 6member committee to explore the implications of a no-code license. Members will be from the Board, industry and the Amateur community at large. (ARRL)

THE NEW WORLD OF AMATEUR RADIO won the Gold Medal in the Science/Technology category at the 1988 International Film and TV Festival in New York. (ARRL)







AMATEUR RADIO CLASSES VIA TELEVISION?


