






Clockwise from top: transmitter module, power-control module, LUSAT module, receiver module.



The meeting was called to order by President John Wallack W6TLK at 7:35PM. Other officers present: Vice President Jim Pelmulder N6PTM, Secretary Al Bloom NIAL, Treasurer Phillip Gaul KC6BSI and Members-at-Large Chuck Sabin N6DDK and John Breckenridge WB6FRZ.

The TREASURER'S REPORT for the month ending December 31 was given by outgoing Treasurer N6PTM. We now have \$929.69 in the General Fund and \$369.81 in the Repeater Fund. Report approved. m/s N60NZ/N600A

DX NEWS: Judd N6QAV felt we should have more discussion about DX on the bands. Steve WA8LLY noted the chaos existing around the 3Y5X Bouvet DX-pedition. Steve has recently worked 47 countries on 6 meters, 27 during last weekend.


The new ARRL FILM will be showing on KOED channel 9 on Sunday at 7:30 PM.


ARRL SWEEPSTAKES RECORD



EAST KIRIBATI. W9GW will active from Christmas Island from Feb. 14-21. Operation will be on 80 through 10 meters.



... Retirement in 1975 and back to hamming in 1976 with a TS-520 and a wire. Quite a change during the layoff. Have to learn all over with this new equipment.

... Haven't been at it as long as some but longer than most. I find that ham radio hasn't changed much in all the years. The technology has changed, but hams are still hams. I'm sure that 50 years from now, when some future ham reminisces, he will say the same thing, that hams are still hams. (How come, after all these years, I still wind up banging a telegraph key? And loving it?)

THEN AND NOW

by (silent key) Jim Tomer W6CYM

I remember...

... My first exposure to ham radio. A 9-year old boy spent his 1922 vacation at the home of his aunt in Wynnadotte, MI and found his older cousin Clayton Blake was a ham, 8AGK. ... After returning home, a quick trip to the five and dime to get #22 enameled wire. slider bars, sliders, end blocks to hold a Mother's Oats box (for the coil form), ear phones, a chunk of galena, a cat's whisker, and a .001 condenser. (Yes, junior, capacitors were "condensers" then.) Pushing Mom to get the oat box emptied. ... Hearing the Pittsburgh, PA broadcast stn. ... My first tube, a WD12. ... Stripping defunct radios for parts. ... Meeting Henry Schurman (now W3DJE, and still a good friend) whose father had been in radio manufacturing and who provided a shop and materials where 3 kids, Henry, Slim

Fox (never became a ham, but spent a professional career in electronics) and I got experience in building radios. ... A later vacation in the mid-20's. Being awakened in the middle of the night by 8AGK yelling at the top of his lungs, "Jim, I worked a Frenchman!!!" Our bedroom was also the shack. The rest of the family thought the house was afire.

... Trying to learn enough to pass the license exam. Few "Elmers" then. Dig it out for yourself.

... Handy's Handy Ham Handbook. Only cost a buck. [Ed note: later the ARRL Handbook.] ...2-stage regenerative receiver. 201A audio. Used "Aero Coils" which were on banana-plug strips.

... The same circuit, but with coils wound on tube bases. Real miniaturization.

...Gluing the foil from cigarette packages to the back of Bakelite receiver panels to reduce body capacity effects. Learned later about metal panels.

...My first "screen grid" tube. A 222 in an untuned RF amplifier ahead of the usual 201A-201A detector and one step.

... A peaked audio receiver in which the audio peaking device consisted of one winding of a Model T Ford spark coil and condenser. Now it's called an INactive audio frequency filter.

...Bootlegging on 40 with a 201A Hartley. Shhh!

... A conditional license W8FBF in 1931. Elation!

...My first QSO with a guy on the other side of Pittsburgh who refused to slow down. ... A loop-modulated Colpitts oscillator on 80 meter phone.

... Transmitting coil mounted on glass towel-bar insulators.

...Double-spacing receiving-type variable condensers for use in transmitters. Atwater Kent made one of my favorites.

... Failing the exam. Utter dejection. ...Passing the test, 10 WPM and 10 essaytype questions, and getting a beautiful big blue ticket from the Department of Commerce & a new call, W8GMA. Boundless exhilaration! ...TNT [Tuned/Not-Tuned] 45A. A real good transmitter.

... A 45 oscillator and 45 amplifier MOPA [Master Oscillator/Power Amp] -- much more stable than the oscillator alone. The shield for the oscillator was an inverted stew pan.

...Zepp feeders with spacers made from halfinch wooden dowels which had been boiled in paraffin for weather-proofing.

... A "Pilot Super Wasp" home-brew, AC version, which worked very well.

... Increasing transmitter power with a DeForest 510 tube.

...A phone rig with crystal control on 80 meters. Had a 510 RF amplifier and a 250 Heising (class A) modulator.

... Calling CQ and tuning the whole band looking for an answer.

...Cussing the guy across town who tore up the band with his push-pull 204A selfexcited oscillator. A little jealousy. perhaps?

... A National SW3 receiver, my first factory job (1933). Was it really much better? ... The stability of electron-coupled oscillators for varying transmitter frequency. Now we could reasonably "zero beat" or tune to a clear spot on the band.

... A Western Electric 242A tube in a selfexcited oscillator on 40 meters.

...Back to a home-brew TRF receiver using 57, 58 and 56 type tubes. Like running into an old friend.

...Taylor T-40 and Eimac 35-T transmitting tubes. Higher power with reasonable cost and good efficiency.

... A Hallicrafters SX9. Lost in a 1940 fire which totally destroyed our home and all my radio gear. Now what? [Next page]



FILLING OUT THE CLUB QSL CARD

Since many people use QSL cards for various awards (WAS, DXCC, etc.), it's important to fill the card out correctly. If there is some essential piece of information missing, the ARRL will not count it for credit.

The essential pieces of information are your call and location, call of station worked, frequency, mode, date and time. It is also customary to include an RS(T) signal report.

Here's a sample QSO filled out on the club QSL card (actual size):

TNX 3 W8CWQSO 7 MHz (CW) FONE 10 NOV88-1452UTC. RST.599. 79! 60

The other station's callsign goes after the "TNX". The frequency band goes just before the "MHz" -- It is not necessary to write down the exact frequency, just the band. Don't forget to circle the mode (CW or fone). This information is essential for many awards.

DATE & TIME: This is where most people foul up. ALWAYS use UTC (French for Universal Coordinated Time, formerly GMT) for nonlocal contacts. Convert to UTC by adding 8 hours to PST. After the clocks "spring" forward April 1, you add 7 hours.

Remember that the DATE should also be in UTC. For example: 8 PM, Monday, FEB 5 PST is 0400, Tuesday, FEB 6 UTC.

In most countries, dates are written in Day-Month-Year order. If you write something like "11/10/88", the DX station won't know if you mean Nov 10 or Oct 11. Some people write the month in Roman numerals: "10/XI/88". Or you can just write the month in English: "10/Nov/88".

Double check before sending your card. It's surprising how easy it is to make a mistake. Most rare DX stations are not willing to search through the log if your time is off an hour or a day. The DXCC certificate you save may be your own!

IMPROVING SALES AT AMATEUR FLEA MARKETS

At Amateur Radio flea markets, buyers bargain for the extra treasures that sellers find in their attics, basements or garages. If you are a seller, how do you get hamfest patrons to buy from you?

The answer is Sales Appeal. Without it, buyers won't skid to a stop ... eagerly make an offer ... and reach for their wallets or purses. To be a successful seller takes a bit of work -- it's just like running a business.

Here are some tips to improve your sales:

- 1. Establish reasonable prices. Ask yourself "What would I pay for this from someone else?"
- 2. Attach price tags and labels. Many cautious customers will not buy "priceless items." On the labels, identify the item -this also helps if someone tries to rearrange price tags.
- 3. Attend popular hamfests. Ask your customers which hamfests they like and why.
- 4. Arrive early and stay late. Hamfest sellers who don't succeed come in late with 50 dollars worth of merchandise and expect to have a thousand dollar day.
- 5. Pick a good location. If you have a choice of location, pick a table with a wall behind it. The outer perimeter is more heavily traveled. Avoid tables near entrances -- this is where people rush by.
- 6. Set up on a table top. Surface space is the key to a good-looking and easy-to-view display. Items scattered on tarps on the ground or under tables do not look inviting because everything is harder to see.
- 7. Organize your merchandise. Buyers like to see a neatly-organized table and are impressed by the quality, appearance and packaging of the merchandise. Profit comes

from having merchandise that appeals to both beginning and veteran Amateurs and is neat, clean and organized.

- 8. Sharpen yourself up. Project a positive, pleasing image. A friendly, welcoming attitude will encourage sales. To be successful, you must act businesslike and look successful.
- 9. Know how to sell. Know what you sell, but don't trap a potential buyer with a long sales pitch. If you're prepared to barter, say so. Have enough money for change.
- 10. Demonstrate that the equipment works. A demo can clinch a sale and may even attract other potential buyers.

You'll soon discover other tips to increase your sales. After the hamfest, save the good items for later, donate the junk to a radio club, or take it to the city dump.

Improving your hamfest sales is really very simple; it requires human relations, creativity, a bit of hard work, and mostly a lot of plain old common sense!
