#### SEVENTY THREE

The traditional expression "73" goes right back to the beginning of the landline telegraph days. It is found in some of the earliest editions of the numerical codes, each with a different definition, but each with the same idea in mind-it indicated that the end, or signature, was coming up. But there are no data to prove that any of these were used.

The first authentic use of 73 is in the publication The National Telegraph Review and Operators' Guide, first published in April 1857. At that time, 73 meant "My love to you!" Succeeding issues of this publication continued to use this definition of the term. Curiously enough, some of the other numerals then used have the same definition now that they had then, but within a short time, the use of 73 began to change.

In the National Telegraph Convention, the numeral was changed from the Valentine-type sentiment to a vague sign of fraternalism. Here, 73 was a greeting, a friendly "word" between operators and it was so used on all wires.

In 1859, the Western Union Company set up the standard "92 Code." A list of numerals from one to 92 was compiled to indicate a series of prepared phrases for use by the operators on the wires. Here. in the 92 Code, 73 changes from a fraternal sign to a very flowery "accept my compliments," which was in keeping with the florid language of that era.

Over the years from 1859 to 1900, the many manuals of telegraphy show variations of this meaning. Dodge's The Telegraph Instructor shows it merely as "compliments." The Twentieth Century Man-, ual of Railway and Commercial Telegraphy defines it two ways, one listing as "my compliments to you:" but in the glossary of abbreviations it is merely "compliments." Theodore A. Edison's Telegraphy Self-Taught shows a return to "accept my compliments." By 1908, however, a later edition of the Dodge Manual gives us today's definition of "best regards" with a backward look at the older meaning in another part of the work where it also lists it as "compliments."

"Best regards" has remained ever since as the "put-it-down-in-black-and-white" meaning of 73 but it has acquired overtones of much warmer meaning. Today, amateurs use it more in the manner that James Reid had intended that it be used —a "friendly word between operators."

I visited an old-time Amateur in Santa Rosa who lives in a mobile home park. No antennas are permitted. He did some deep thinking and came up with this solution:



## SHORTWAVE CONVERTER FOR THE CAR RADIO

For those of you who like to listen to shortwave broadcast stations in the car, the front cover of Short Skip shows a design by Holger Eckardt DF2FQ that appeared last month in CQ-DL, the German QST. You hook the antenna to the "input" and the car radio antenna wire to the "output". It switches to shortwave mode automatically when you apply 12 volt power.

As shown, it covers the 49 meter band (5.5 to 6.5 MHz). To cover other bands, change the crystal frequency and modify the input filters. For example, to receive 10 MHz WWV, use a crystal around 9 MHz or so. Reduce the values of C2 and C5 to a value that gives the best sensitivity, and reduce C3 until sensitivity just starts to drop.

T1 and T2 are 10.7 MHz IF transformers with core color orange. The European fieldeffect transistors specified don't seem too critical. An RCA SK-3112 is listed as a substitute for both the BF245 and BF246. You might also try a 2N4416, but watch the pinout -- there is no standard lead arrangement for FET's as there is for bipolars. A 3N140 should work for the BF961. It does have the same pinout. Any DPDT 12V relay that fits should work for K1.

The unit was built on a 30x60 mm (1-3/16 x)2-3/8") PC board. A 1:1 layout is reproduced on the front cover.

If it fits, the most elegant place for the converter is inside the radio. Hook its 12V input through an un-needed switch, such as the stereo/mono switch (normally used only on FM). If it won't fit in the radio, use your imagination in locating the converter on/off switch.

will be fresh vegetables and as many other goodies as the cook's enthusiasm warrants.


The MEETING DATE in July will be Tuesday the 3rd instead of the first Wednesday, July 4.

Meeting adjourned 8:35 PM. m/s KB6PTA/NIAL Respectfully submitted, Sec. Al Bloom N1AL.■



KERGUELEN. FT5XA is fairly active on 20 meter SSB between 1200 and 1300z.


MINAMI TORISHIMA. JA9IAX/JD1 plans to be active through August.

## DO YOU HAVE YOUR ENVELOPES ON FILE?

A recent conversation with a local QSL Bureau member brought up an interesting but sad fact. Most overseas QSL cards are Simply thrown in the trash because the Ham addressee does not have any envelopes on file. The buro operators usually wait 90 days to trash them, but no one ever seems to remedy their problem. With the number of cards coming in, you should not depend on the Bureau sending you a reminder slip to send more envelopes. Also envelopes are never thrown away, so some have 17 cent stamps on them. Send them a few stamps for your old envelopes.

Overseas Hams QSL about 80% of the time. They don't ask you first if it's OK. If you're a new Ham like me, don't get on 10 meters and start MAKING overseas contacts without first sending envelopes to the QSL Bureau. The overseas Ham will send a card quicker than a blink, and for nothing. See the next column for Bureau addresses.

To foster better international brotherhood, and out of plain courtesy, get those cards printed and mail some envelopes to your QSL Bureau before hitting the airwaves. If you don't remember when you last sent envelopes then it might not hurt to send some new ones. I know it's been an education for me. 73 and make this QSL Month. Tnx CompuServe
