





MARCONI SPECIAL EVENT STATION

Why have a special event? In the past, the club has had several, but not for some time. Some have fun communicating with Amateurs in many interesting places. Others have fun watching others do the communicating. In the case of the Marconi station, you can have a little part of history in your life.

Marconi could be called the first Amateur. He discovered wireless transmission in 1897 and was awarded a patent in England.

His first big undertaking was at the American Cup races in the United States. He transmitted the results as they happened from ship to shore.

By 1990 he had started the giant "Marconi International Marine Communications Co. Ltd" in England. In 1901, he had selected Poldhu and had an installation ready for testing.

He found a place on Cape Cod called Wellfleet, where he located the American station. The antenna system was the same at both sites: 20 masts, 200 ft high, in a 200 foot circle. These did not last long as winter storms took them down. Shortly after this, on December 12, 1901, a kite antenna helped him send the letter "S" across the Atlantic.

In 1902, Marconi had 4 250 foot towers built from wood and well-guyed for protection from winds. The equipment used worked in the 1500 to 1800 meter bands with around 30,000 watts of power. Messages were sent at about 17 words per minute. Stability of signal was not one of their virtues.


By 1903, news was transmitted from America to England by wireless.

Between 1903 and about 1911 was a building era for Marconi. Several telegraph companies were taken over which expanded Marconi to about 500 ship units and 70 land stations.

THE PHILIPPINE EARTHQUAKE has generated considerable local and regional Amateur Radio activity. Avoid transmitting on emergency net frequencies. The Red Cross was not accepting incoming welfare inquiries as of July 17. The WIAW bulletin

THE ARRL FCC FILING on the codeless license proposal will strongly reaffirm ARRL's request to retain the Novice and Technician licenses and inclusion of Novice testing under the Volunteer Exam program. W1AW

THE CODE TEST WILL BE WAIVED for disabled individuals who produce a physician's note affirming they are unable to copy 13 or 20 wpm code. This is being handled on a waiver basis for now, but a rulemaking will be initiated in the very near future. [Ed note: is the day coming when the written test will be waived for our developmentally disabled citizens?] Tnx ARRL Letter

PRESIDENT BUSH CHANGES AMATEUR RULES. The above-mentioned code test waiver was due to intervention from the top. Tom McMillen WB3HGW has epilipsy and takes medication which slows his brain function. After repeated failures to get the FCC to waive the 13 wpm code test, he appealed to King Hussein JY1 of Jordan, who contacted Pres. Bush. Bush had the Dept. of State contact the FCC about a waiver. This, plus interest in Congress about aid for the disabled, has prompted the FCC to instigate the rulemaking procedure. Tnx Westlink Report

DX NEWS



FROM THE DXCC DESK: YEMEN. The DXCC desk has accepted the documentation for the 701AA operation. The operation has been fully accredited. The DXCC desk is waiting for advice from the DX Advisory Committee as to what country listing is proper credit.

PENGUIN ISLAND. DL8CM/ZS1 has been active and will possibly be a new one. He has been heard and worked from western New York and is active on 14029 and 7001 KHz. Signals have been weak and little activity. On phone the call could be ZS9AAA/1.

COCOS ISLAND. TI2US, TI2ZM and TI2CF are on their way to Cocos Island and should arrive July 19th. They expect to be on the island for at least one week, operating in the normal DX slots, both CW and SSB.

OMAN, A41JV. KJ4GK will be handling the QSL chores for A41JV, Salim. All cards for contacts since July 4th go to KJ4GK. Salim is a good CW operator for those who need this one on CW. He can be found on the low end of 15 and 20 meters.

BHUTAN. The latest word on a possible VU operation from here is an application has been submitted by a VU but at this time no license or permission has been granted to this group by the A5 authorities.

SAINT PIERRE. A group will be signing FP/VE1DXX or an outside chance of an FP call sign from August 14 to 19 on 160 through 6 meters plus 2 meters EME and satellite activity. No WARC band activity is planned. QSLs will be handled by Al, VE1AL.

KERGUELEN ISLAND. FT5XH and FT5XA continue to show up alternating each morning on 20 meter CW or SSB. They can be found on 14020 and between 14190 and 14200 KHz starting around 1100z.


PALMYRA ISLAND. Watch for activity by Steve, AA6LF, signing /KH5 starting around July 22. The operation will last about a week taking place on SSB on 20 to 10 meters. QSL via his home call.

MARKET REEF. A group will activate this one from July 27 to August 2. Callsign will be OJO/KF7PO on SSB and OJO/N7BG on CW. Usual DX frequencies. They will activate some of the WARC bands. QSL to KF7PO.

ALBANIA. The latest rumors state that some Hungarians will demonstrate Amateur Radio sometime in July to the Albanian authorities. With the possible political situation in Albania at this time, there seems little chance of it taking place.

TAIWAN. About one month ago, 400 applicants took their license test with over 100 passing the qualifications for low band operation. Watch for more and more BV stations to appear in the near future.

MARCONI (continued)

SHORT SKIP

In 1913, 228,000 messages were handled, which grew to 379,000 by 1913.

In 1917, upon the US entry into WWI, the Navy took over 53 coastal stations and 370 ship units. Marconi still existed as a manufacturing company, now selling to the Navy and others.

In 1920, American Marconi was taken over by RCA. The transmitting station was, and is, in Bolinas. The Marshall site was closed, and the receiving station moved to Point Reyes, where it is still in use.

The Marshall station extended 8 miles toward Petaluma. 8 massive vertical masts covered that distance for antenna support. Parts of the base structure can still be seen.

THE EVENT

The old Marshall Marconi site has re-opened as a conference center and historical site, part of the California State Park system. We Amateurs will be participating in the grand opening Saturday September 8. Tentative plans are to have 2 or 3 exhibits to display an antique Amateur station as it was then, along with a working HF and 2 meter packet station to show Amateur radio as it is today.

Many politicians and other VIP's will be present, including Marconi's daughter, who is flying out from the East coast. We will need volunteers to operate and to act as "tour guides" for the visitors. Contact John W6TLK if you are interested.

SILENT KEY


