SCRA MINUTES

August 1, 1990



The meeting was called to order by President John Wallack W6TLK at 7:30PM. Other officers present: Vice President Jim Pelmulder N6PTM, Secretary Al Bloom NIAL, Treasurer Phillip Gaul KC6BSI and Members-at-Large Chuck Sabin N6DDK and John Breckenridge WB6FRZ.

VISITORS were introduced by Jane N6NTB: Stu Clark WA6BTK, Bill Martinez & Steve Lassen.

The MINUTES were approved as printed in Short Skip. m/s N6DDK/N6VUC

The TREASURER'S REPORT by KC6BSI shows \$1572.93 in the General Fund and \$755.43 in the Repeater Fund. Approved m/s N6VUC/N6DDK

REPEATER: N6PTM has overhauled the Repco portable repeater to fix the standby ID'er power supply, etc. The present 450 MHz control receiver has poor sensitivity. N6PTM reports that WB6PER recommends we buy a new S-com controller and a 4AT synthesized 450 HT for a control receiver. This would give us a non-volatile ID'er, courtesy tones, and a more sensitive control receiver at a cost of about \$355. This was moved by N6PTM and seconded by N6QAV and passed by the club.

We will also work on adding battery backup to the repeater. Al NIAL has donated a deep-discharge battery. Bob K6GEV asked if the new antenna is working OK. Jim replied that yes, it is working much better.

PUBLIC SERVICE Chairman Bill N6GHG reports great response getting volunteers. We have finished the Rump Stomper, Day on the River, and Harvest Century events. Coming up are the Vineman Triathalon Aug 4, Stride for Life walk Aug 18 and the Bodega Bay to Breakers race on August 26. N6DDK moved that Bill be recompensed for phone calls and other expenses. Passed. m/s N6DDK/WB6FRZ

EDUCATION Chairman John WB6FRZ has had 8 students pass their Novice test already with another 4 taking the test tonight. John may do another class. We need more instructors.

Upcoming ACTIVITIES include the Marconi special events station on Sept 8, with setup Friday night. (See John W6TLK). The 8th annual SCRA Flea Market is Sept 15. Call Chod WB2CHO to help. (Phone numbers, p. 2.)

OLD BUSINESS: Volunteers for Net Control Station for the Tuesday night net were obtained. August: N6VUC, September: WA6BTK. and October: N6RMW.

NEW BUSINESS: NIAL has a copy of the new ARRL Annual Report if anyone is interested.

AMATEUR CITED FOR NEWS-GATHERING. W4YKH has been cited for gathering news for NBC during the recent revolution in Trinidad. It's OK to listen "passively" on the air and pass the info on to the media, but FCC monitored W4YKH actively requesting information from a ham in Trinidad which crosses the line of illegality. DX TIPS By Fritz Anderson WT9T

Here's a few Tips From the Experts that I picked up from observing actual operations during an evening's DXing.

DX stations receive better than they transmit. If you can't hear the target of a pileup -- ID him from the people who work him and call anyway! So what if you have no way of "knowing" whether he ever called you? He'll know.

DX operators are kind of dim about American callsigns. For instance, if your callsign is KE9SC, and the DX calls, "eight bravo, call again?" DON'T WORRY. HE MEANS YOU. Go ahead, correct the callsign, and give him your name and report. Stations all around the planet will hear your skill, and say to each other, "what an ace!"

Say you can actually hear the DX station. You notice that he calls his next station within three to five seconds after calling QRZ. REPEAT YOUR CALLSIGN FOR AT LEAST FIFTEEN SECONDS. Almost all DX transceivers are able to receive while transmitting, so the fact that the DX is almost certainly giving a report to someone else during most of your call should not concern you.

North & S. Yemen have recently disappeared, East and West Germany are about to go, and the news from Korea is bad. Nothing on the DXCC list is safe. EVERY CONTACT COULD BE YOUR LAST. Treat it that way. Sure it's just an EA1, but who knows if there's even going to BE a Spain next week? Go for it all-out: Your fellow amateurs will respect you all the more for stepping all over them.

Some amateurs waste valuable time expressing an interest in the DX's family, hobbies, life, etc. Famous 20-meter experts agree that foreigners actually hate Americans, and fuzzy-headed solicitousness merely plays into the hands of the Red Brigades. DON'T LET SOFT-SOAP TALK ABOUT, SAY, LEUKEMIA, BLIND YOU TO WHAT THIS QSO REALLY IS: An opportunity to let the DX know they have a chance to ditch this bore, and exchange 5-9s with you. So keep blasting away with that ID of yours! If the DX wanted human contact, then why is he living at the backof-beyond in the first place?

Pileups are lonely, hard work. If you want to exchange pleasantries with your friends while the DX is working somebody else, go right ahead. Everyone will understand. Why one fellow -- I have his call right here, he was following every last one of these rules -- was complaining to his friends that the DX "seemed to be ignoring" him.

Imagine. Ignoring a great op like that. Just shows what these foreigners will do.

And don't forget to "Elmer" the new op who may not understand split frequency operation. You must remind him over and over that the DX is listening "up 5." Of course, you must do this by transmitting on the DX station's transmit frequency. The best time is while the DX station is actually transmitting, since that's when the stateside stations are listening closely and will best benefit from your superior knowledge.
