Cross Charging Batteries



When batteries are combined together in a bank, they are often connected in parallel in order to provide increased amp-hour capacity. To insure that the bank will have both a maximized amp-hour capacity and life span, the interconnections must be configured using a technique called cross charging.

Cross charging is a wiring scheme that insures that each battery in a power system will have the same voltage. This is accomplished by providing an equal number of interconnections between all parallel-connected batteries and the load.

If this sounds even a bit mysterious, please refer to the two examples below. In example #1, you can see that the batteries closest to the main connections will be charged and discharged more than those further down the line. The batteries at the opposite end of the system can become sulfated, which greatly reduces their service life. Cross charging as shown in example #2 effectively combines the individual batteries into a single power unit, thereby maximizing both power efficiency and battery life.



The meeting adjourned at 6:54 PM. m/s N1AL/K6ZWB



SCRA's **Beginnings**

SHORT SKIP

Going through some old boxes, more information on the beginning of SCRA was found. In



1939, a group of interested Amateurs organized the Sonoma County Radio Amateurs. There were about 14 members that first year, and they split the year into two parts. The officers for the first part (February) were Floyd Barnes W6ADM, President and L. J. Wallace, Secretary/Treasurer. For the second half of the year (June), the officers were Frank Day W6SAT, President and L. J. Wallace again, Secretary/Treasurer.

Maybe you can remember hearing of the following members during conversations with old timers: B. B. Bachelder W6JPW, E. G. Lowry, Floyd Barnes W6ADM, Wm. S. Mann, Frank C. Day W6SAT, Paul McFarland W6EDA, Geo. Holman W6CKL, Gordon Meade, Phil Kohn, Robert Schieffen, Wm. G. Levendale W6HSQ, E. H. Levight, L. J. Wallace and Geo. Snelson K6RCR.

In 1940, the club had enlarged to 19 members, with L. J. Wallace as President. He was not licensed but very interested in Amateur Radio.

SCRA affiliated with the ARRL in 1939. The original certificate was found in a box of stored papers and is on display at the County EOC. The club has maintained this affiliation since 1939, some 54 years ago.

There was about an 8-year break in the history of SCRA between 1941 and 1949, with no recorded activity. World War II took out Amateur Radio and the recovery was slow.


"Operating a 2M packet BBS ... is boring, tiresome and, for the most part, useless."

"With the hierarchical forwarding system, things went to pot... it would have been much simpler with zip code routing."

One really should read the entire article, which goes into great detail, with examples, about problems inherent in the forwarding "system."





PROJECT MOONRAY (by W60L0)

In only 6 years and 8 months we will be entering the 21st Century. Now is the time to start thinking about formulating some interesting future plans for the continuation of Amateur Radio in Space projects. During our last few annual meetings at Project OSCAR headquarters, we have elected to revive Project MOONRAY as a possible original concept that might become a stepping-stone for more exotic projects throughout the 21st Century. These might even include additional Lunar Experiments, Space-Station, Mars, Venus, Jupiter, Asteroid and Deep-Space Probe Amateur Packages.

Some of us (I include myself, now pushing 79) may not live to see Project MOONRAY materialize, however we would like to leave Radio Amateurs world-wide with a legacy we started when we originated Project OSCAR in 1960.

I dreamed-up the idea of putting an Amateur Repeater on the moon in 1965 during the APOLLO manned lunar exploration program when I met with Owen Garriott, W5LFL, astronaut in training, scheduled to go to the moon on forthcoming APOLLO 18, or 19 or 20. I used Project MOONRAY, short for moon relay as an identifier of this concept. The idea was to build a package that was to fit under the seat of the Lunar Rover vehicle. I had contacted NASA with this concept and they agreed to accept a package that would fit a space vacated by the exchange of batteries when Fuel-cells would be installed in the Lunar Rover vehicle. Hopefully, Owen was to be the driver and would have been the astronaut to erect the MOONRAY package on one of Lunar Rover's excursions. We were to arrange a special connector that would mate with his space-suit headphone/microphone connector so that he could plug in to the MOONRAY package and make a few contacts with hams on earth. He would then leave the package and continue on his routine assignments. Numerous articles were published about Project MOONRAY and Amateur Radio enthusiasts world-wide were intrigued and very excited about the idea of having a repeater that could be accessed by hams world-wide as long as they had the moon on their side of the earth. Unfortunately, Congress cut off funding to NASA for any further lunar landings beyond APOLLO 17 and our MOONRAY project was temporarily' shelved.

Lunar exploration, Lunar habitats or colonies and numerous Lunar projects have recently again surfaced. No specific dates or schedules have yet been set, however it is not too early to plan for Amateur participation in one (or more) future Moon visits as well as for other possible "out-of-this-world" concepts.
