

IS IT HERE YET?

Want to find out what if your new FCC license has been granted? Has it been 10 days since you took your examination?

If so, Call ARRL at 1-860-594-0300 (8 am to 5 pm weekdays, eastern time) to find out. We suggest that you not call the FCC (should you choose to call the FCC at 1-800-322-1117 during business hours, be aware that their number is normally busy).

Your hardcopy (printed) license would follow shortly after the license grant is indicated in the FCC Amateur Service data base.

If your test was coordinated through the ARRL/VEC, license turnaround time will be approximately 7-15 days. This includes 1-5 days for the VE team to complete their processing (the team has up to 10 days before they must mail the results), 3-5 days between the VE team and the VEC; 2 business days at the VEC (in some cases only 1 day); and 1-3 business days at the FCC. Allow 5 business days from the date that the VE team estimates the test session results will reach the VEC.





THE SCRA 10 METER NET by Joe KE6LNQ



It doesn't matter, you may have a palm sized Sony or Sangean shortwave receiver. Maybe a suitcase sized Hallicrafters or Collins that has seen decades of use. On Tuesday nights at 8 PM tune to 28.450 MHz upper side band. You will hear the SCRA's high frequency net.

For you new to HF, listen carefully. At 8 PM, tune to 28.450 MHz. Tune slowly a bit up and down from the net frequency. Dial calibrations may be off a little. Make sure you listen on upper side band if your radio offers USB and LSB. While tuning slowly, turn your whip antenna to different directions, try vertical and horizontal polarization. Best results will be obtained with an outdoor antenna of any type. Check the ARRL antenna handbook for details on constructing simple 10 meter antennas.


This is what you will hear: A practical demonstration of HF operation. We use ground waves mostly, sky-waves if we are lucky (more on this in a moment). You may hear the difference between vertical and horizontal polarization. The different signal strengths of a wire dipole, vertical or Yagi antenna. Microphones sound different from on e another, signal processor's well adjusted or not. How far does a ground wave travel? You will know - you will hear it! There is a lot to learn about HF operations. Different than 2 meter FM operation through repeaters, that's for sure. But both have their place in this multi-faceted hobby of ours.

This radio get-together is informal. Net control is expertly provided by Bill KA6JLP. For all of you gams with HF privileges, please stop by and say hello! We would like to hear from you.

When conditions are such that skip conditions prevail (see sky-wave propagation in your license manual) our Sonoma County hams may be joined by hams from across the western states or from around the world! Exciting? You bet. Give a listen. Tuesday nights at 8 PM, 28.450 MHz USB.
