


CINCINNATI HAMS RESPOND AS TORNADO STRIKES

The Cincinnati Section SKYWARN Weather Amateur Radio Net was in operation April 9 when a killer tornado struck the Blue Ash/Montgomery area of the city around 6 AM. Six people died as a result of the storm, which caused heavy damage and power outages. WARN, with its W8NWS net control site at WLW radio, quickly reported weather conditions and damage as it occurred and alerted police and emergency crews.

As a result, WARN Public Information Officer and ARRL PIO Michael Nie, KB8VMX, ended up as the live lead story on the 6 o'clock news on April 15 on Cincinnati's WKRC-TV Channel 12. The station's Chief Meteorologist, Tim Hedrick, interviewed Nie live on the value of severe weather spotters and especially ham radio spotters.

"I was shocked," said Nie. "All the press releases and business cards finally paid off." During the interview, Nie told how two local spotters used Amateur Radio to relay the first reports of a tornado on the ground, as they dove for cover in a ditch. Despite the close call, the spotters were not injured.

The Queen City Emergency Net provided communication support on VHF with operators at various emergency operating centers, command posts, shelters, and disaster relief agency headquarters. QCEN is affiliated with the Cincinnati Red Cross and typically provides damage assessment and communication support for the agency. EMERGENCY EFFORT GETS NATIONAL TV COVERAGE


An effort to obtain health-and-welfare information via Amateur Radio from Yugoslavia war zone got some national media attention recently. Thanks to efforts by the ARRL, Diane Ortiz, K2DO, and Stephan Anderman, K2SMA, a TV news crew from Fox News Channel spent about two hours April 10 at the Long Island home of Mid-Island Amateur Radio Club President Mike Christopher KG2M, where this operation is taking place. A three-minute feature aired the following day on FNC.

On April 9, Christopher, who's also ARRL New York-Long Island Section Bulletin Manager, activated MIARC's International Emergency Assistance Unit for the purpose of passing health-and-welfare traffic from refugees in the Yugoslavia war zone to family and loved ones in the United States. This is being accomplished with the help of Drago, T94GB, in Bosnia-Herzegovina, the only country in the Balkans with which the US has a third-party traffic agreement. T94GB will be QRV daily on 80 meters with the war zone and refugee areas, gathering health and welfare traffic, then passing that to the IEAU on 15 meter SSB for forwarding to the National Traffic System -- The Hudson Loop via Mike Grant, N2OX



FCC OFFICIAL ACKNOWLEDGES OOs REALLY ARE "OFFICIAL"

April 1999

The FCC's top amateur enforcer, Riley Hollingsworth, K4ZDH, says that hams who receive notices from ARRL Official Observers should take them seriously or take the consequences. "Failure to take the notices seriously and to take corrective action where possible will not be tolerated by the Commission," Hollingsworth said in an enforcement-related letter to a South Carolina amateur. "The volunteer work of these Official Observers is a critical element of the Commission's enforcement program," he said, adding that failure to act on an OO notice could lead to fines and other sanctions.

Hollingsworth's comments were contained in an April 7 station-inspection follow-up letter to Richard Whiten, WB2OTK, of Easely, South Carolina. Hollingsworth and an FCC engineering team visited Whiten's station on January 22 after what Hollingsworth called "longstanding complaints" about the operation of Whiten's station. Whiten reportedly cooperated in the station inspection. According to the FCC letter, the Commission has received "numerous complaints" about Whiten "regarding profanity, obscenity, broadcasting extreme racial slurs, deliberate interference and failure to properly identify." Hollingsworth also said he'd heard complaints that Whiten had played recordings over the air "for the purpose of harassment or deliberate interference." Hollingsworth noted that Whiten had "apparently ignored notices from Official Observers," and pointed out that the volunteer OOs work "in accordance with an agreement between the Commission and the ARRL and in accordance with our statutory authority." Hollingsworth also took advantage of the opportunity provided by his letter to Whiten to spell out the FCC's position on obscene and indecent Amateur Radio transmissions. "Obscene speech is not protected by the First Amendment and cannot be broadcast at any time," he advised. Indecent speech also is not protected between 6 AM and 10 PM, in accordance with the so-called "safe harbor" policy the FCC uses with commercial broadcasters.

I wanted to report to you about an emergency communications exercise that we held here in the North Bay area on March 20th. It was sponsored by the Emergency Radio Response system (ERRS) of the LDS or Mormon church. The area involved stretched from San Rafael to Santa Rosa. There were 16 wards (congregations) and about 70 ham radio operators involved, making it the largest exercise of it's type held here. Additionally, we had several local hams with extensive disaster experience participate and observe.

It began at 0900 with each person departing from home and traveling to their church building. There, they established an emergency operations center, complete with operating radio station. An emergency communications net was established on the KC6NEO repeater (147.285). We used a series of questions and responses rather than a disaster scenario. With that many units on the net, we really had to have strong net control!

The net continued until 1100, when we began an "on the air" debriefing.

Each unit was able to talk about lessons learned and problems encountered. Later, a more informal debrief was also held at the local pizza spot. Was it worth it? Everyone involved certainly thought so. We learned, for example, that "Murphy" is alive and living in Northern California. Radios overheated and broke, batteries failed, coax had the "wrong" connectors; you name it and it happened. Our learning curve seemed to go straight

Most of us want to do it again and soon. It was well worth our time and effort. The lessons learned were important and valuable preparation for an actual emergency.

We would recommend an exercise like this to any organization that wants to be ready for a disaster. I would be happy to provide copies of the operations order and scenario to any interested party that wants to hold a similar program.


