SPUNKO'S SPARKS

I was gathering material for my talk this month on surface-mounted parts for The Club's general meeting, and I started thinking about how hard it is to work on new amateur radio equipment, which in turn led me to think of the new software-defined radios built by Ten-Tec and Kachina. They are built like modern computers which have a motherboard and then daughterboards for different operations. If you need to do a repair or to upgrade the radio, you do not have to send it back to the factory but can either get a new board or an exchange rebuilt board. And on the software side, the FCC has just made a ruling on software-defined radios. As you can tell from the wonderful lecture we had last month by Bob Nelson KG6DLL, there are many new types of modulation and some that have not even been invented yet! On the old-style radios it would either be a matter of sending it back to the factory for modification, or it may not be compatible with that modulation scheme at all. With the new softwaredefined radios it's just a matter of downloading the new software from the manufacturer's website. So if you're thinking of purchasing a new radio, do consider the new style radios.

SCRA and County DES in Conflict over 146.73

As reported in last month's *Shortskip*, per the County's request, SCRA began transferring its radio operations from Sonoma Mountain to English Hill and Castle Rock. The County delayed without explanation SCRA's possession of club owned equipment.

On January 29th, Chris Godley of the County Department of Emergency Services (DES) telephoned SCRA President and Repeater Committee Chairman Gregory Gordon and advised him that the County had turned on the Sonoma Mountain 146.73 repeater. At this point, the County was operating the repeater with components wholly owned by SCRA.

Very shortly after the County activated their radio, deliberate interference to ongoing QSOs on SCRA's repeater were heard on the frequency. The SCRA weekly net held on January 30th was frequently interrupted by someone "keying up" the Sonoma Mountain transmitter. There has been periodic interference from that point on.

SCRA hand delivered a letter instructing the County to stop using SCRA property without permission and to allow the club to retrieve its



Haighton, VE3FRH, have continued to be optimistic that AO-40 will have a useful life of Amateur Radio service. Command stations James Miller, G3RUH, Stacey Mills, W4SM, made a long-term prediction of AO-40's new orbit. They say that even after last year's incident—which silenced the satellite for nearly two weeks—and the resulting decrease of perigee, AO-40's orbit willbe stable, although perigee will oscillate by several hundred kilometers.

AMSAT-DL says the recovery effort has been slowed somewhat because of limited access time on the part of the command team, due to AO-40's current orbital parameters.

Discussions of the future of AO-40 are expected to dominate the eighth AMSAT-DL Symposium on March 17, AMSAT-DL said. (From ARRL)

Letter to the Editors

Dear Editor.

Recently two messages were posted to the email list of the ACS (Auxiliary Communications Service, a.k.a. RACES, the county-sponsored amateur emergency communications group). They were complaining about interference to the ACS 146.73 repeater on Sonoma Mt. from the SCRA 146.73 repeater on English Hill. I posted the following reply:

Unfortunately hams, being human beings, are tribal animals. "My

group is the good guys. The other group is the enemy." Why is it so hard to see the other group's viewpoint?

Who is interfering with whom is very much a debatable issue. SCRA had their repeater on the air for several weeks before the ACS repeater on Sonoma Mt. came back on.

We as members of SCRA and ACS should not let ourselves be drawn into participating in this stupid us-versus-them game.

MAINE LAWMAKERS KILL MOBILE HAND-HELD **DEVICES BILL**

A Maine legislative committee has killed a bill that would have made it illegal to use hand-held electronic devices such as cellphones and two-way radios while driving. ARRL State Government Liaison Zane Keeler, AA1WV, reports the Joint Standing Committee on Transportation on February 21 reported out an ought-not-to-pass recommendation for LD 95.

The bill would have restricted the use of hand-held cellular telephones as well as "computers, Citizens Band radios, dictaphones, microphones and other electronic devices" not essential to the operation of a vehicle on Maine's highways.

The same legislative panel also turned away a similar, but less restrictive bill, LD 102. Both bills would have permitted the use of hands-free accessories for cellular telephones used on the road.

The committee's vote on both bills was 7-1. Keeler said both bills are dead for the current session. Those opposing the bill included several Maine Amateur Radio operators, cellular telephone providers, emergency medical service providers, and the American Automobile Association. The state Highway Safety Bureau took "a neutral position" on the measures.

Several hams, including Maine Section Manager Bill Woodhead, N1KAT, were on hand February 12 for a public hearing before the legislature's Transportation Committee. Keeler said a half-dozen Maine hams showed up for the February 21 legislative workshop.

In Maryland, a bill to ban the use of hand-held cellular telephones while driving was killed February 15 by a House of Delegates committee on a 14-7 vote. Several other states are considering similar measures. While no states have banned cellular telephone use altogether, California, Florida and Massachusetts impose some restrictions on their use. Nearly 40 states have considered such legislation since 1995. Five municipalities require drivers to use hands-free technology within their borders. (From ARRL)

AO-40 FUTURE RESTS ON REDUCING SPIN, REGAINING ATTITUDE CONTROL

The key to a successful AO-40 recovery effort continues to be a matter of reducing the satellite's spin and regaining the ability to adjust its attitude from the ground. "The current problem is the lack of accurate AO-40 attitude data," AMSAT News Service said. Accurate data are not available because AO-40's sun sensor is not seeing the sun because of the satellite's attitude.

Only when ground controllers can accurately determine the satellite's attitude will it be possible to change it and correctly aim AO-40's high-gain antennas for optimal reception on Earth--and that's assuming the transmitters are functioning on bands other than 2.4 GHz. Ground controllers have had no luck hearing AO-40's transmitters on the omnidirectional antennas on 2 meters. 70 cm or 1.2 GHz. Since the satellite's computer was reset and telemetry resumed December 25, the AO-40 ground team has been analyzing telemetry sent via the 2.4 GHz beacon--the only transmitter now operating.

AMSAT-Germany described AO-40 as "in the fog". because its high angle with respect to the sun temporarily prevents the sun sensors from providing attitude data.

Ground controllers have been pinning their hopes on a previously announced "de-spinner" programming routine that would permit AO-40 spin control without having to rely on the sun sensors. The satellite's current spin rate is reported to be 17.7 RPM. But even if the programming fix fails. "it's no cause for panic." AMSAT-DL said. By April, controllers reason, the satellites sensors will again see the sun and "thanks to magnetorquing, spin and attitude can be actively improved upon the rising tide." Once the spin is reduced, sun angle improved, and antennas pointed, testing can resume. Still outstanding are tests of the VHF and UHF transmitters, the arc-jet motor, and the reaction wheels, among others.

Both AMSAT-DL President and AO-40 Project Leader Karl Meinzer, DJ4ZC, and AMSAT-NA President Robin

equipment. Government use of personal property without authorization is a federal offense. Once the County's legal department was made aware of the situation, County DES removed the SCRA owned equipment and made it available for the club to pick up on February 6th.

County DES has applied to the Northern Amateur Relay Council of California, Inc. (NARCC) to take over the coordination on 146.73 from SCRA. SCRA has objected in that pursuant to NARCC's published Policies and Procedures, SCRA held a coordination for its English Hill location since June of 2000. Also, SCRA, including the 1982 merger with the Sonoma County Amateur Radio Service, has operated the 146.73 repeater since 1974. SCRA has evidence that NARCC has violated its own guidelines and bylaws in responding to the situation.

An important issue being raised is the concept of a local government agency seizing an amateur radio frequency under the guise of needing a public safety frequency. Public safety services have separate licenses in the commercial bands for just such a purpose. By definition, frequencies in the amateur radio service are not available to government agencies in this manner.

SCRA has filed a complaint with the FCC naming the County of Sonoma and Jack Rosevear KD6LSO as involved parties. Rosevear is Deputy Chief of the DES and his call sign is being transmitted as the ID on the County's Sonoma Mountain transmitter.

ARRL Pacific Division Director Jim Maxwell W6CF offered to act as an intermediary between the SCRA and the County. ARRL San Francisco Section Manager Leonard Gwinn WA6KLK welcomed Jim as Len himself has had a less than positive experience with County DES and desired a potentially unbiased mediator to assist. Jim approached SCRA President Gregory Gordon and met with the SCRA Board of Directors on Thursday evening, February 22nd, after having met with County DES personnel earlier in the day. At this writing, Jim has heard from SCRA and County DES, and, is working to find an amicable solution.

In the meantime, SCRA President Gregory asks all users of the SCRA 146.73 repeater (PL 88.5) to respect any ongoing QSO on the frequency regardless of which repeater is being used. '

Nothing could be further from the truth. False statements such as this rumor only serve to inflame the situation, which evidently was the intended

OOs do not issue "pink slips," the term used for the violation notices sent by an FCC monitoring station. If warranted, an OO sends a postcard advising the recipient of any alleged transgression of Part 97.

Merely operating on either 146.73 repeater does not constitute a violation. It is hoped that all Hams will observe common courtesy and good operating practice while the frequency issue is resolved by others.

ARES Comm Log

Awhile back we had a face-to-face and the subject was "Emergency Kits" (or "Go Kits" or whatever else you wish to call them). Anyway, there is a lot of information published by a lot of authors in a lot of books about what should be included in these kits. At this meeting I found that a few minutes talking to some people who have field experience is worth all the books in print. Don't get me wrong, I'm not downplaying the importance of books it's just that they should be used as a starting point for putting together your own kit rather than being viewed as a definitive treatise on the subject.

Everyone knows the kit basics – 2-meter HT, pencil and paper, extra batteries, appropriate clothing, and food and water. From there, most lists propose more of the same – extended amounts of equipment, food and personal items. This is the point where I learned some "new" items that common sense says could be really important in an emergency situation. I have never seen these items appear on suggested kit items and I thank the ARES members who attended the face-to-face for their input. I'll leave the relative importance for you to decide if you wish to include them just give them some serious consideration.

First Aid pages from the phone book: There is a wealth of first aid information in each and every phone book and it's there for taking. Just rip out the pages from an old one and keep them in your kit.

<u>Dust masks</u>: You never know when you might be in a high-dust environment and these will keep you from hacking and wheezing into your microphone.

<u>Hemostats</u>: These handy emergency room tools are great for holding wires to be soldered or clamping off an artery.

Metallized blanket: Weighing only a few ounces, these blankets will keep you dry and warm when the going gets rough.

Finally, there are whistles for signaling your location, ponchos to keep you dry in the rain, and a leatherman tool to fix just about anything. And, don't forget some candles – flashlights are great but you may need those batteries for communications and a candle will give you light for quite a few hours.

Remember, your emergency kit is kind of like car insurance you hope you never need it but it's good to know you have it just in case. Get yours ready while you have the time to give it some thought – it's a lot easier than trying to scramble the items together at the last minute.
