

AO-40 Team Starts Slowing Spin Rate

Initial efforts to slow AO-40's spin rate have been successful. Peter Guelzow, DB2OS, of AMSAT-DL and the AO-40 team says magnetorqueing has been able to decrease AO-40's initial spin rate from 17.59 RPM to 15.9 RPM. "The target is something in the area of 5 RPM," Guelzow said this week.

The onboard magnetorqueing system--which consist of solenoid coils--makes use of Earth's magnetic field to control the spacecraft's spin and orientation. Magnetorqueing is most effective when Earth's magnetic field is strongest, so it typically only takes place at perigee--when the satellite is closest to the Earth. Ground controllers have been making incremental adjustments during each perigee.

Guelzow said that as soon as the spin is favorable, AO-40's attitude will be adjusted to improve communication with Earth. De-spinning the spacecraft is a necessary first step to making any attitude adjustments, however.

Amateur Radio Spectrum Protection Act of 2001 Introduced

The Amateur Radio Spectrum Protection Act of 2001 is now officially HR 817. Rep Michael Bilirakis of Florida introduced the bill on March 1 in the US House of Representatives. ARRL President Jim Haynie, W5JBP, and ARRL First Vice President Joel Harrison, W5ZN, visited the Congressman's office to thank him personally for his continuing interest in protecting amateur allocations.

The measure has been referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce. The bill seeks to amend the Communications Act of 1934 by requiring the FCC to make no reallocation of primary Amateur and Amateur-Satellite allocations, diminish any secondary Amateur and Amateur-Satellite allocations, or make additional allocations within amateur allocations that would substantially reduce their utility without also providing equivalent replacement spectrum.

Early this month, a contingent of ARRL officials went to Washington for a three-day round of visits with senators and congressmen and their staff members. Haynie and Harrison also visited the FCC, where they spoke with Peter Tenhula, Chief of Staff to FCC Chairman Michael Powell.


Haynie was upbeat about the impact of the visits. "Once again we had an opportunity to tell our story about Amateur Radio and the important function it serves, especially in public service and education," he From ARRL said.


ULS at SCRA Meetings

ARES Comm Log

I was originally intending to write this month about the January earthquake in India, but then the Seattle/Tacoma area got hit with a 6.8 temblor, and, since it was much closer to home, I changed my plans to comment on that event. After all, Amateur Radio was in it's prime.

Local ARES and RACES teams were mobilized within minutes after the ground stopped shaking. The Salvation Army's SATERN net and Military Affiliate Radio System (MARS) were activated shortly thereafter. A 2-meter net was set up to assist the Red Cross with damage assessment. Three or four HF nets activated and passed hundreds of health-and-welfare messages. They even had an ATV link from a helicopter to the State EOC where Governor Locke was on hand to survey the damage below. There were very few injuries that required hospitalization and no deaths resulted from the quake. Very impressive!

I read a small article in WorldRadio about the India quake. It was only a paragraph long and the gist of it was that Ham radio's part in the event was coming to a close and the Bangalore Amateur Radio Club, which had posted several members to the quake zone, already had returned to Bangalore. Then the impact of this short article hit me. It said that the earthquake killed more than 50,000 people, injured many others and left upwards of 1 million homeless. It went on to say that in the immediate aftermath of the earthquake, Amateur Radio provided the only reliable communication with the outside world. Read that sentence again: ".....Amateur Radio provided the ONLY reliable communication with the outside world!"

Even now, over a month after the earthquake, communications systems have only partially been restored. Some of the hams assigned to the disaster area have only recently returned home. Incredible!

I certainly don't mean to undermine the severity of the Seattle quake nor do I mean to downplay Amateur Radio's importance in the event. Amateur Radio played a critical role in assisting both government and service organizations and should be recognized as such. I just want you to think about what may happen in the event of a really BIG disaster in this area. Actually, make that ".....WHEN a really big disaster strikes this area." How would you react in the wake of a large-scale disaster? Are you prepared for it?
