





The Purpose of SET

This month, October, brings us the annual ARRL Simulated Emergency Test (SET for short). Many hams not involved in emergency and public service radio have criticized these exercises as just so-much useless role-playing. Indeed, even some involved hams occasionally tire of passing made-up messages just for the sake of filling up bandwidth. We need to ask ourselves if the SET really accomplished any goal.

The answer is, if done right, ABSOLUTELY YES! We all know that exercise messages are not real. In fact, it doesn't matter if they're even believable. The real purpose of SET is to strengthen our ability to accurately pass traffic in an orderly manner. It really has no bearing on whether the drill is about an earthquake, a fire, or an invasion of little green men. What does matter is if we have the capability to initiate a message at one point, relay it via amateur radio, and have it correctly received at a desired destination. That's it! Remember, we are communicators our job is to get the message through.

Realistically speaking, as horrific as the terrorist attack in Manhattan was, the collapse of the World Trade Center is a drop in the bucket compared to the mass destruction an 8.0 magnitude quake can cause. The attack was contained in a relatively small geographical area whereas a major quake or the use of WMD (Weapons of Mass Destruction) would cause much more damage and loss of life. As contained as the WTC event was, communications were a mess.

Despite news coverage showing people at 'Ground Zero' using their cell phones, that was not the case in the sense that people might assume. They were dialing numbers, true, but they did not get through! The only cell phones that worked, occasionally, were special 'dedicated' Private Virtual

This situation occurred as the result of two factors: massive blocking by health & welfare telephone messages and by physical destruction of several telephone and cell phone exchanges. The New York Telephone building is 400 feet from the North East Tower of the World Trade Center – three times as close as the WTC was tall. AC power was cut to the building; its switching equipment (that which was still working) was working on 48-volt battery backup usually engineered for eight hours power. The two WTC buildings each had both PABX and NY Bell local switching equipment that was totally destroyed.

The Police and Fire Public Services regular commercial radio channels were also completely overwhelmed with blocking traffic. They were not engineered for the voice/data traffic levels required to coordinate the efforts of almost a thousand police and fire professionals nor were they designed to coordinate the efforts of thousands of additional non-professional volunteers. And, maybe most important of all, they were not engineered to provide interlinked 'broadcasts to all'. What was available was Amateur Radio.

The entire New York City area had bandwidth in the HF, VHF, UHF and SHF Amateur frequencies cleared for emergency traffic. There was an existing large inventory of portable amateur radio sets in place at OES. There was also an additional large inventory of portable radios with licensed and capable radio operators on-scene at both 'Ground Zero' and pulling shift work on a round-the-clock OES Communications Central.

The traffic did not consist only of 'health & welfare messaging' but Priority One Directives issued through the OES communications facility. Many broadcast messages were relayed form the top levels of NY City government to the public service employees working on the rescue effort providing immediate communications including a 'warning to evacuate' when #1 Liberty Plaza Tower was indicating imminent collapse at any moment. In NY the usual concepts of Amateur Radio being merely a tertiary communications application - a redundant 'backup' and 'health & welfare messaging' system - were historically overturned forever. In a real disaster of titanic proportions - in an 8.0 magnitude earthquake, in a military attack resulting in mass destruction, or in a targeted attack on specific key communications nodes in ALL these situations Amateur Radio will be a PRIMARY, not tertiary, communications system for the mission essential messaging of City, State, and even Federal Command and Control.

That is why we have the SET.
