Today, Why Amateur Radio?

I was skimming through CQ magazine's June 2002 edition a couple of weeks ago and came across the editorial Zero Bias by Rich Moseson W2VU titled "Gone Fishin'." This column is taken from that editorial and many of the points Rich made are repeated here.

As I like to talk up Ham Radio and teach classes, I many times get the question, "why Amateur Radio" with today's cell phones, FRS and GMRS radios available to the general public without the need of a license. My stock reply is that Ham Radio is like fishing. You can go to a store to buy a fish if you really want to eat one, but to catch your own fish, that's the real experience. I have read and been told that if you are fishing just to catch the fish, you have missed the point. (I won't get into my fishing skill which spawned the phrase, "You can't even buy a fish!") Kind of the same with Amateur Radio. I still am amazed at the magic of radio every time I contact a new country or make an HF contact mobile with very limited equipment and antenna. You have to work at it, but when it happens, it is magic!

We also make many friends in the hobby. Some local, some from far away places that we may never meet, but they remain our friends for years to come.

As Rich points out in his editorial, few other hobbies, like fishing and horsebackriding for example, yield new developments in technology that is taken up by commercial interests like Ham Radio. Amateur Radio's history is full of innovations that have gone on to commercial use. (continued on page 3)

Field Day 2002 Lots and Lots of Fun!



Field Day 2002 was another banner event for SCRA this year. Activities Chairman Mark Lockwood KK7CU. his first time running the show, along with key project leaders, put together a memorable Field Day. Antenna Chairman Brian Torr N6IIY once again arranged a very effective array of radiators. The club used two surplus military tube towers to support the A3S and TH-6 beams. Supported between the towers was a multiband dipole complete with "visual RF indicators." (You had to be there!) Further North along the antenna line were Brian's 40 meter wire beam and an inverted V antenna. Brian also erected a rather unique antenna that many quizzed him about. When John Breckenridge WB6FRZ asked Brian what type of antenna it was, Brian replied, "Why it's a sloop, John B." (Beach Boy fans will figure this one out.)

One new feature of this Field Day exercise was the use of a military CP tent for all radio operations. The tent, provided by the local Civil Air Patrol (CAP) squadron #157, was the focal point of the event with all stations side-by-side. It also was the main gathering point for the group allowing easy observations and participation in the radio activities. Inter-station noise was kept down by use of headsets.




Public Service Events Calendar






