

ARRL'S DEAN STRAW TESTIFIES ON BPL AT CALIFORNIA HEARING

ARRL staff member Dean Straw, N6BV, testified February 8 in San Francisco at a California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) public hearing on broadband deployment--including BPL. In his nearly six-minute testimony on the draft policy decision crafted by CPUC member Susan P. Kennedy, "Broadband Deployment in California," Straw--an electrical engineer and an ARRL technical editor--decried the fact that the section of the document dealing with BPL--broadband over power line--neglected to mention the technology's disadvantages.

"I feel there is further work necessary on the sections dealing with broadband over power line--BPL," Straw testified. "There is not a single mention made of the three most significant disadvantages of BPL." These, he continued, include interference from BPL to radio receivers, interference to BPL from radio transmitters and a lack of bandwidth for expansion, especially in instances where BPL interference must be mitigated in some fashion.

"We are not opposed to Internet broadband (continued on page 8)



services," Straw maintained on behalf of the Amateur Radio community at large. "We're not categorically opposed to Access BPL, but we are opposed categorically to interference."

Kennedy, who chaired the hearing, stopped Straw from reading into the record the CPUC's own cautious reply comments on the BPL proceeding, although she did say he could submit them in writing. While generally supportive of encouraging more competition within the broadband industry, the CPUC's reply comments recommended the FCC "ensure that adequate testing is performed and

industry standards are developed before any deployment takes place." The CPUC also noted "significant disagreement in the industry over the level of interference."

"The statements made by the CPUC in June of 2004 in reply comments to the FCC are now being--rather incautiously, I'd say--thrown to the wind," Straw declared. The attitude toward BPL in Kennedy's broadband deployment policy document, if adopted by the full commission in its present form, would represent a 180-degree shift from its position of less than a year earlier, he said.

The broadband policy Kennedy drafted calls for California to "encourage deployment of BPL by its electric utilities by providing regulatory certainty in the areas of its affiliate transaction rules, in the treatment of BPL program expenses and revenues, and exemption from Section 851 requirements for the use of utility assets." And it says the CPUC "should adopt this policy framework proactively without waiting for an application to be filed by an electric utility for a BPL project."

Straw said the broadband policy appears to represent "a wholesale embracing" of BPL. "I urge caution in that," he said. "There is still a great deal of science that has not been done on BPL in terms of interference and interference mitigation."

In December, the ARRL suggested that Kennedy temper the "excessively optimistic" view of BPL she'd expressed in an interview. "It has yet to be demonstrated that BPL systems can be deployed without polluting the radio spectrum," ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ, wrote Kennedy December 10. "Until this issue is resolved, we respectfully suggest that public statements that paint an excessively optimistic picture of BPL are inadvisable."





Becoming Prepared

I must admit that "writer's block" has set in this month (along with an endless list of other things that I had on my agenda that will probably never be completely addressed!) so I've decided to resurrect a previous column that I did a few years ago since it seems timely in light of the continuing series of storms we've experienced lately. In northern California, we're used to bearing the brunt of the winter Pacific storms but, lately, we've seen the serious consequences of nature unleashed in the southern part of the state. Many years ago it almost became commonplace to experience an annual flood on the Russian River but I never remembered hearing of devastating flooding in Los Angeles such as we've recently seen. Southern California was always the place you went to get away from the stormy weather - Disneyland and palm trees used to be the cure for the winter doldrums!

Preparedness is one of those things that we know we ought to do; we all want to do it, most of us never do it, and only a very few of us make a serious attempt to do it. I guess the first question to ask is "For exactly what situation am I becoming prepared"? Since it's impossible to prepare for every event, the most prudent approach is to begin small and expand your preparedness over time; that goes for both the physical items you assemble and your knowledge base.

First of all let's tackle the physical items – otherwise known as "the kit". Ready kits, go-kits, or whatever you call them, are simply a collection of items that may come in handy in an emergency. The other attribute of the kit is that it should be easily portable. Don't try to collect everything in one day. My personal kit started on a visit to K-Mart when I spotted a plastic tool box on sale. It's about 8" x 8" x 15" long and I liked it for two reasons: it has a bright yellow lid that's easy to see and it came with a flashlight that snaps to the lid top so it's always handy. Over the past year I've collected an assortment of items inside that I believe I'll find useful in time of need. Nearly every emergency manual has a list of items that the author suggests you

put in your kit... and nearly every list is different. If you've attended previous ARES face-to-face meetings, you know that the list of items can seem endless. Every time we discuss this topic I hear a few new ideas to incorporate in my kit (and I hope I've given someone a new idea, too). This column is too short to include a comprehensive list of items but let me know if you're interested and I'll be happy to give you a listing from which you can pick-and-choose.

Having a kit does not, however, mean that you're "prepared". The second part of preparedness requires some learning on your part to know what to do with the items you've assembled. It means gaining the knowledge necessary to protect yourself and your loved ones when a disaster strikes. Just as having a drawer full of paints and brushes does not mean you're an artist, having a box full of equipment does not mean you're prepared for an emergency. A major advantage of ARES is that service to our served agencies is reciprocal. While it's not a condition of service, most of our served agencies are happy to provide us with free training because it makes us more valuable volunteers; it also increases our level of preparedness. Courses in CPR, first aid, damage assessment, are just a few of the training sessions available to us. An excellent place to start is with the ARRL emergency communications courses currently being offered online. Many of you have stated that the classes are always full when you try to register. Keep trying... you'll eventually get in and it's definitely worth the effort.

Preparing for emergencies is akin to preparing for retirement; you'll never get ready unless you start and most of us think we have more time than we really do!
