To Volunteer or Not

By the time you read this, the year's public service events will be over except for one ... and

perhaps our largest event of the year ... Waves to Wine. Also, you probably fall into one of two categories: either you've participated in public service events, had a lot of fun, and learned some new communications skills or, you've managed to go another year without volunteering and you're just doing your own thing. After all, why should you spend your time working public service when you'd rather be rag-chewing or DXCC?

Besides the fact that each and every one of us who holds an FCC-assigned amateur radio callsign is mandated with providing public service as a condition of our license, there are a lot of operating skills we can learn. Every bike race, foot race, or walkathon we support provides us with a substantial amount of valuable experience. Whether you are net control or a checkpoint operator, you will learn the discipline necessary to support emergency communications. You're probably already a very good talker but these events will teach you to be a good listener. You will also learn how to relay information when direct communications do not reliably work and how to concisely transmit messages with minimum wording and maximum accuracy.

Think of public service as a practice field – a low risk method of learning skills that will be useful when the situation becomes critical ... skills you cannot learn during an emergency event because there simply isn't enough time to teach them to you. As hams, most of us enjoy talking; that's one reason we're hams. We like to talk about nearly anything and most of us can spend hours doing just that. But, when a net is running at full steam handling traffic, there is no time for idle chatter. Transmissions must be short and to the point and they must be accurately delivered to the intended recipient.

Take the opportunity to volunteer - it will sharpen your operating skills. These public service events also give us the opportunity to educate non-hams about our hobby and to demonstrate its usefulness to others.

Everyone benefits: you, our served agencies, and amateur radio in general.

So ... what's it going to be? Are you going to step up to the plate and offer your services while enjoying a nice day with your fellow hams or are you going to let another year go by while letting others promote amateur radio for you?






SCRA Club Meetings
