It's that time of the year, folks. Holidays, year-end events, and club elections. It's time to thank those of you who have so generously donated your time and

effort this last year to make this club a success, and it's time to select a new team of officers and directors. As we think about elections, it's appropriate to see what SCRA has accomplished so far in 2007, what areas need attention, and our vision for the future of SCRA.

As I look back, 2007 has been a good year for SCRA. We've had terrific public service events, with a big thanks to our public service chairman Craig, K6XLT. Interest in ARRL's ARES program has flourished under the guidance of our emcomm chairman, Rich, KF6SZA (ARRL Pacific Division Ham of the Year!). We've provided the community with volunteeradministered ham examinations, thanks to our VE liaison, Brian N6IIY. We've had interesting speakers at our wellattended meetings. We've had a very professional newsletter, thanks to our editor Vicki, KF6ZCT. We've had a successful ham class for the first time in years thanks to Rich, KF6SZA and John WB6FRZ. And we've had excellent participation at our club events, such as SRIC Day under the Oaks, Field Day, PCAM and JOTA. We've reorganized the club into a public benefit non-profit corporation, thanks to the tireless and sometimes thankless work of Pat, KG6JSL We added a new amplifier to our two meter repeater, thanks to John, KE5RI, our repeater chairman. At this point the club remains financially solvent. And, a big thank you to all of you for your support of, contributions to, and participation in SCRA.

So where did we stumble? Well, we haven't promoted new membership as well as we could have: we need a membership chairman. We didn't get out to visit KPH as we had hoped: we need an activities chairman. We haven't had a raffle at the meeting in a while. And I've felt somewhat trapped by the fact that there has been no vice president to pick up the slack when I'm away, so I haven't been away very much. Looking forward, we need new leaders for the club. A few of you have agreed to step up to new Board positions in 2008, and I hope other candidates will emerge at our November elections meeting.

Our current bylaws limit office terms to no more than two consecutive years. Brian N6IIY has served as treasurer for the past

two years and cannot continue to serve in that office. Thank you, Brian, for your many years of selflessly devoted service to the club. Pat KG6JSL has indicated a willingness to take on the treasurer's position if elected. If Pat is elected treasurer, his Board member at large position becomes vacant. Bob KG6ZDN is hoping to go to sea as a radio electronics officer in 2008, and has decided not to seek reelection as the other Board member at large. Thanks for serving, Bob. Fred KQ6OB has agreed to continue to serve as secretary if reelected. Thank you Fred. I didn't seek the president's job last year, but agreed to serve after no one else stepped forward. It's a great job that should be passed around. I'd love to have someone step up to the president's office, but in the absence of other candidates, I'm willing to serve a second term if the club so chooses.

As we complete 2007, let me share with you my vision of SCRA: "SCRA is the oldest and one of the largest amateur radio organizations in Sonoma County, with members located throughout the county and in adjacent counties as well. We provide a full range of amateur radio activities with a particular emphasis on public service, emergency radio communications, and education." In continuing this vision in 2008, SCRA should continue to expand club membership by attracting new members and retaining current members by appealing to their interests, and by providing informative programs at its meetings and a variety of membersupported activities. The club needs to continue to develop and expand its core competencies of public service, emergency communications, and education. We need to develop new club leaders amongst our members. We need to update our repeater system to the latest technology. And, we should provide on-line distribution of Short Skip. These are realistic goals, and I hope the club will pursue them in the coming year and in the years ahead.

Thank you for the opportunity to be of service to the club in 2007. It's been personally very rewarding, and it's provided me with the opportunity to get to know you all better. See you at the meeting!




SCRA Club Meetings



SCRA Hosts Ham Class

Classroom A at the Oakmont Main Recreation Center served as the classroom for SCRA's technician level ham class, given over the weekend of October 27th and 28th. The goal of this course was not only to generate new licensees, but to provide enough background information to the class to enable them to understand the reasoning behind the exam questions. This course is quite unlike the other single day or weekend classes that concentrate solely on memorizing correct answers to the exam.



The coursework included study of an extensive handout book distributed to each class member about a week before the class. The course included viewing video presentations arranged as eleven individual study blocks, each covering a particular subject of the examination. Study blocks included the magic of radio, types of emissions, electrical principles, frequency privileges, operating considerations, antennas and feed lines, repeaters, safety practices, RF radiation safety, and FCC regulations. Each study block was followed by a question and answer session and a practice test, followed by a short break.

SCRA charged those in attendance \$10.00 for the course which included the course book and refreshments over both days. Those in attendance included all age ranges from senior citizens to teenagers. Our thanks to John WB6FRZ and Rich KF6SZA for preparing the course materials and presenting the course; and, to John KE5RI and Fred KQ6OB for arranging for use of the Oakmont facility and for all of the fine logistics support. Everyone in the class said that John and Rich put on an excellent presentation.

Thirteen of the fourteen class members obtained Technician Class licenses, at the VE session on Sunday afternoon. Several of the class members joined SCRA. We plan to repeat this class in the not-too-distant future. It works!

the station. Additional members with a General license are needed for control ops. Craig K6XLT will deliver the SCRA banner.

4. 4. HAM Class - The first HAM class is scheduled for October 27-28 in Oakmont. The instructors will be John WB6FRZ and Rich KF6SZA. There are 26 people currently signed up for the course. The Video and manual in PDF format are done. The manual will be distributed one week in advance so the students can read it before the class meetings. The board decided to charge each student \$10 to cover the cost of the manuals. There will be a VE session on Sunday afternoon. Scheduled examiners will be Brian N6IIY, John KE5RI, Bill KH6GJV and Dave W6IBC. John WB6FRZ and Rich KF6SZA will check out the Oakmont facilities on October 23.

5. CAL Site Hearing – Dave W6IBC, John KE5RI and Fred KQ6OB attended the hearing to determine whether the site permit for the English Hill repeater site should be renewed. Dave W6IBC made a presentation on behalf of the club. Approximately 50 people gave short presentations most of which were in favor of renewing the permit. The Sonoma County Board of Supervisors recommended that the permit be renewed.

6. SCRA Corporation Status — Dave W6IBC reported that in order to get a Tax Identification number, the club will need to submit our net worth and financial records for the last 3 years. Brian N6IIY was asked to gather the financial records. Dave W6IBC will assign values to the recently completed list of assets.

7. Repeater – John KE5RI recommended that the club purchase a new Kenwood Repeater. The cost is \$1100. The board asked John to obtain the specifications for the proposed repeater and find out whether Kenwood plans to continue this repeater for the next few years. The board also would like to know whether this repeater could be used in a voting repeater system. After some discussion, the board decided to ask the new board in January to form a committee to develop a repeater plan for the 21st century. New Business

1. Nominating Committee for New Board – A nominating committee has been setup to develop a list of candidates for the new board. The nominating committee consists of Dave W6IBC, Brian N6IIY and Pat KG6JSL. The committee will present the list of candidates to the club at the November meeting.

2. Short Skip – Vicki KF6ZCT has being doing an excellent job as editor of the Short Skip newsletter. She has request that we start looking for a replacement for this job. The club would like to develop Short Skip in a PDF format which could be electronically distributed to the club members. Bob KG6ZDM volunteered to develop a template using the Word format.

3. November Program – The program for the November club meeting has not been finalized. Fred KQ6OB was asked to contract Tim K6MDD regarding a program on D-Star digital radios. If Tim is not available on November 7, it was decided that we would have a panel discussion on HAM Basics to provide information to the new Hams graduating from the HAM class in October.

4. Bank Signature Cards – Brian N6IIY circulated some signature cards to authorize certain club officers to sign checks on behalf of the club.

5. Holiday Party—The holiday party will be planned at next month's board meeting. Brian N6IIY was requested to investigate getting the food from the same source as last year.

6. Ham of the Year- The board members were requested to think about possible nominations for the Ham of the Year award.

John KE5RI moved to adjourn the meeting at 8:15. The motion was seconded and passed.

Riley Hollingsworth Decides Not to Retire

Riley Hollingsworth, K4ZDH, Special Counsel for the FCC's Enforcement Bureau, has decided not to retire. He had announced last week that he would leave the FCC in January 2008.

Riley states, "After spending the entire weekend thinking about the decision [to retire], it became more and more clear to me that it just isn't the right decision for me right now. There are several issues on the table that I want to continue to work through with the amateur community."

The Enforcement Bureau is the primary organizational unit within the Federal Communications Commission that is responsible for enforcement of provisions of the Communications Act, the Commission's rules, Commission orders and terms and conditions of station authorizations, as well as enforcement of Amateur Radio rules (Part 97).

1. Call to Order - President Dave W6IBC called the meeting to order at 7:05 at the Luther Burbank Arts and Garden Center. 2. President Dave, W6IBC demonstrated a software defined radio contained in a dongle which plugs into the USB port on a PC. 3. Introductions - Dave W6IBC introduced the board. Roy Johnson, KI6FFO was our only guest.

4. Approval of Minutes -- The minutes from the September meeting were approved as published in the October Short Skip. 5. Treasurer's Report - Brian N6IIY reported on the balances in

Checking and Savings accounts.

6. Public Service - Craig, K6XLT reported that the Wine to Waves cycling event went very well. He thanked all who volunteered their time.

7. ARES - Rich KF6SZA announced that there would be a training class on "Communications Basic" on Monday October 15th. There is also supposed to be an ENSA drill in October. 16. Repeater Committee – John KE5RI reported that a committee is being formed to develop a plan for the SCRA repeater systems in the future. One element of this plan is the acquisition of a new

Kenwood repeater for our 2M system. The cost of this repeater is \$1,100. The board has decided to delay buying this repeater until the Repeater Plan has been completed. Hopefully, the club will also have our tax free status by that time which should help in raising funds for the complete system. A suggestion was made that we contact the MS Society to see if they would make a donation towards our new repeater system. SCRA has provided communications for the MS Society cycling events using these repeaters for a number of years.

17. PAVE PAWS - The DOD has upgraded its OTH radar system which uses 440 MHz as a primary user. Since Hams share this band on a secondary basis, we cannot interfere with their operations. Although we have not been sited, SCRA may have to modify the operation of our 440 repeater to comply with any no-

interference directive from the FCC.

18. Program -John KE5RI gave a very interesting presentation on Ham Test Equipment. Much of the equipment used by Hams is relatively old and can be obtained quite cheaply. John presented a number of rules he uses when testing radios. These include:

a. Think ahead - "What will happen if..?

"Am I comfortable doing this"?

c. When working with high voltages keep one hand in our pocket.

d. Check and ground capacitors.

Define problem (inputs and outputs)

Check power and external fuses.

Check internal power supply and fuses.

Check input (antenna connected?)

Use your eyes and nose to help diagnose the problem.

Failures are usually simple (1 or 2 components) John then demonstrated some of the test instruments he uses in his lab. These included: digital volt meter, analog volt meter, oscilloscope, magnifying glass, frequency counter, signal generator, heat gun, can of coolant, and a RF detector.

San Diego ARES Amateurs Stand Down after Wildfires

With the wildfires in Southern California well on their way to be being contained, San Diego area ARES Amateur Radio operators have ceased assisting their served agencies; many hams had been called to action early last week. When the fires began early Sunday morning, October 21, ARRL San Diego Section Emergency Coordinator Jim Cammarano, KG6R, conferred with California Fire VIP Red Flag Coordinator Rich Beisgl N6NJK; Beisgl told Cammarano that local ARES groups were not needed at that time. "A few hours later, I called again and our status remained the same. They assured me that they would call me immediately if they required [assistance from] San Diego ARES. With the Santa Ana winds blowing, the fires had rapidly advanced far beyond the point where volunteer radio operators would be safe in performing such a role," Cammarano said.

Cammarano said that San Diego ARES "first started up an information Net before any concrete news from the mainstream media existed. People were checking in with facts about road closures, traffic congestion and reports on the locations of the fires. Once we were told to deploy by the San Diego County EMS [on Sunday afternoon], I initiated our Web-based automated call-out system that made more than 400 calls in less than five minutes."

Hams were deployed all over the San Diego area, including Mt Palomar, home of CalTech's 200 inch telescope. ARRL Assistant SEC Teri Rowe, KI6FKD, a Registered Nurse, was appointed Incident Command nurse, providing a supply of responders available for initial deployment and replacement

personnel. "She compiled manpower reports and lined up personnel well in advance to the Medical Operations Center order to deploy. On Sunday evening, she manned three phones and two PCs monitoring the County WebEOC online message boards, keeping us updated with road closures, patient transports and hospital evacuations. She answered questions, reviewing the ICS forms and calling each hospital Incident Command RN or Officer to coordinate deployment of the responders," Cammarano said. "Mark Williams, KF6ZBF, manned the radio room at Kaiser Zion (a local hospital); he assisted an RN onsite who had her radio license, but who needed help. Mike Green, W6MTG, helped Teri on Tuesday, making calls to our members, all while evacuating from his home."

Many ARES hams were busy serving local hospitals, some working for more than 15 hours, Cammarano said. "Hospitals asked our responders to help get their staff deployed to the hospital to relieve their overworked personnel. At one point, a trauma center was in danger of losing a communications tower. Numerous hospitals were evacuated and patients were transported. We were there as back-up if the critical communications links were broken. As the order to change our status from deployment to standby came, many responders were asked for their contact information in case they were needed again." While many hams did not pass emergency traffic, many communicated critical information regarding the status of other hospitals to the various Incident Commanders at the facilities where they were deployed, Cammarano said. "The hospital staff was thankful for the support from our responders, for many feared that the fire might force the repeaters on Mt Woodson off the air, causing the hospitals' regional radio link to ambulances to fail, resulting in a serious impact of hospitals to prepare for arrival of critical cases or transports to other vital trauma centers in the county."


