BACK TO SCHOOL

A recent news report on communications failures at a 2007 WTC building collapse caught my attention. According to the story "firefighters sent more than 30 distress signals, includ-

ing 14 maydays, from inside the burning bank tower, but some weren't heard because they came in at the same time. Scoppetta blamed 'a failure of radio discipline' and said firefighters would be trained to allow the urgent signals to come through one at a time, keeping channels clear once one signal is posted" (The Press Democrat, August 22, 2008). Wow, NYFD firefighters who didn't know how to communicate effectively over the radio in an emergency. This report points out the value in continuing our training as amateur radio communicators to cope with emergencies and the unexpected.

September, the back-to-school month, is an appropriate time to discuss the need for continuing our education as radio amateurs. Fortunately, our amateur radio community offers both formal and informal educational opportunities. On the formal side, ARRL offers a wide range of on-line educational courses, including three excellent courses for emergency communications (EMCOMM), and other courses relating to licensing and technical aspects of amateur radio. FEMA offers on-line courses specifically directed to emergency response. Local communities and agencies are sponsoring formalized training in programs such as COPE (Citizens Organized to Prepare for Emergencies) and CERT (Community Emergency Response Teams). Ham radio fits nicely into these programs as a communications backbone. But nothing will work as planned unless we are trained and practice to maintain our proficiency as effective communicators.

On the informal side continuing educational opportunities abound. SCRA sponsors a host of public service events each year. Each month SCRA presents a program at its membership meeting covering a topic of interest to our members. SCRA sponsors three nets on its repeater system, the ARES net on Monday evening at 7:30 pm; the SCRA Service Net on Tuesday evening at 7:00 pm; and, the West County Newcomers Net on Wednesday evening at 7:30 pm. These nets are interactive opportunities for us to practice our net discipline skills and to be sure our equipment operates as it should. SCRA has an informal mentoring program that provides technical advice and help to those who request assistance. Please let us know if you need help. SCRA offers periodic ham classes for entry level licensing. (Our next class is September 20, 21 at the Sebastopol Fire Station.) ARES provides periodic classroom training specifically directed to its mission.

Each of us should periodically take an inventory of our radio skills and capabilities and decide how we can improve them. Continuing our education not only increases our value to the community, it provides us with the satisfaction of knowing we have skills others can count on. In an emergency, let's be ready!

Thanks to all of our members who turned out and supported our booth at the PCAM Wings over Wine Country show in August, particularly our team leader Pat Coyle, KG6JSL, who pulled the event together. See you at our meeting on September 3rd. This month's meeting will cover repeaters.




SCRA Club Meetings

It Could Happen Any Time

rat-Herald. I think it is appropriate to all radio amateurs.

If you're going to be stranded on the side of a Canadian highway, and you happen to find yourself sliding down a 150-foot embankment while you're there, it's helpful to have a ham radio operator along. That's what sixth-grader Sarah Weishaupt of Sodaville found out this summer during a family road trip to Canada with her mother and stepfather, Kaynor and Nick Heineck.

The trip had started off badly anyway. Two days before they left, Nick, 68, had given himself a bad cut with a router and was traveling with one hand wrapped in splints and bandages. Then, the first day on the road, the RV blew a tire. But the worst part came on June 28, when the transmission on the family's Ford pickup went out two-thirds of the way up a steep grade. They had been headed to Jasper, on their way to the Canadian Rockies. The area didn't have any cell phone reception, so Nick, a longtime ham radio operator (WL7K), fired up the mobile station in the pickup.

He made contact with a ham in Montana, who gave him the frequency of the local repeaters in the area. Then he managed to reach a man (Al Lindstrom, VE7AZQ) in the town of 100 Mile House, about 80 miles from where they were stranded. Sarah, who was then a few weeks shy of her 10th birthday, was outside tossing rocks over the edge of the canyon while Nick talked with the man about finding a tow truck. Her mother went into the RV for a nap. Then, said Sarah, she reached for a rock and the ground crumbled away under her feet. Sarah grabbed for the edge but couldn't stop sliding. Feet down, on her stomach, she tumbled about a hundred feet down the steep embankment.

"I had slid into a weed patch, and it stopped my progress somewhat," she recalled. "I did a damage check before Mom came down, and I found I was scratched and bleeding. I was actually sane enough to register there were some pretty monster ants on the wall I was trying to hold onto." Sarah yelled for her stepfather, but it was her mother who heard her first. Dozing in the RV, Kaynor, 52, an avid birder, was struck by the odd sound of what she first took to be a bird squawking faintly, "Ick! Ick!" Kaynor got up and asked Nick where Sarah was. When he replied she had been tossing rocks over the cliff, she realized what had happened. "I was terrified," she said, recalling the sight of her daughter about two-thirds of the way down the cliff. Sarah assured her she was all right,

just stuck. "My knees got scratched, but other than that, I was fine," Sarah said.

Kaynor directed her to crawl to a nearby log lodged in the gravel, where she could hang on and keep from slipping farther. Nick found a coil of eighth-inch, 500-pound Mylar rope, which he uses to string antennas. With its damaged transmission, the truck couldn't be moved, but it was close enough to the edge for Kaynor to tie an end to it and try to lower herself to Sarah. Halfway down she realized her plan wouldn't work. The rope was strong, but thin and slippery, and Kaynor didn't think she could pull Sarah to safety. She considered having Sarah and herself slide the 30 feet or so more to the bottom, then look for a way out of the canyon. But by this time, Nick was frantically trying to raise his contact in 100 Mile House again — "to tell him the problem had gone from serious to life threatening," he said — so Kaynor decided just to wait and keep Sarah company.

The man in 100 Mile House radioed back to say a search and rescue team and members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police were on their way. Several minutes later, Nick saw an approaching truck marked "FIST," misread the label as "FIRST," and flagged it down, thinking the response team had arrived. It turned out to be a truckful of Canadian youths. "And the funny thing is, they were mountaineers and had all their gear with them," Sarah recalled. "And so one of them named Jamie came down and got me." Jamie climbed behind Sarah as she went, hand over hand, to the top. A few minutes later, the Mounties and the search and rescue team arrived, having at first gone the wrong direction in search of the stranded family.

FCC to Raise Vanity Call Sign Fees

On August 11, the FCC announced that the cost of an Amateur Radio vanity call sign will increase 60 cents, from \$11.70 to \$12.30. The fee will increase 30 days after notice of the increase is published in the Federal Register; no date has yet been set for publication. The FCC is authorized by the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, to collect vanity call sign fees to recover the costs associated with that program. The vanity call sign regulatory fee is payable not only when applying for a new vanity call sign, but also upon renewing a vanity call sign for a new 10 year term.

The vanity call sign fee has fluctuated over the 12 years of the current program -- from a low of \$11.70 to a high of \$50. The FCC said it anticipates some 15,000 Amateur Radio vanity call sign "payment units" -- or applications -- during Fiscal Year 2009, collecting \$184,734 in fees from the program.

- **7. Repeater Issues** John KE5RI reported that the interference from the WA6FUL is worse. This maybe short lived as they are thinking about going to a digital repeater. In the mean time, John recommended that all members use tone code squelch when using the repeater. Several times in the last week, someone has been transmitting Galzen noise on

our repeater using our PL tone. The Board asked John to approach the FCC to determine what information is needed to document this harmful interference. With the passing of Allen WA6MXI, the Board would like to know the future status of our repeaters on Castle Rock and English Hill. John KE5RI was asked to approach Cal-Site and find out this information. John was also asked to put on a courtesy tone and squelch code on our 220 repeater. There was some discussion regarding the feasibility of obtaining a second repeater. This repeater would be purchased as a backup repeater in case the current repeater fails. The second repeater could also be placed on Castle Rock and could be tied into the English Hill repeater If the second repeater was operated in a receive-only mode, there would be no interference to the sensitive equipment on Castle Rock. The second receiver would extend the range of our repeater system into Oakmont and the east Sonoma area. John was asked to look for a source for a circulator/isolator. John KE5RI will present this concept to SCRA members at the September meeting. John also reported that the DOT has published a huge list of 440 repeaters which are "interfering" with their PAVE PAWS system. Some of the repeaters on the list have not been on the air for some time.

New Business

- **1. Membership Data Base** Dave KF6CLG reported that he has been unable to contact the printing company which sends out Short Skip by mail. He therefore had copies made at Kinko's and personally sent them out. The cost was \$1.65/copy. The Board approved to reimburse Dave for the cost of this mailing.
- **2. Club Generator** Dave W6IBC reported that no one expressed an interest in buying the club generator at the last meeting. He therefore recommends that we seek approval at the September club meeting to donate the generator to the Pengrove Antique Machinery Museum.
- **3. Member of the Year** Dave W6IBC asked Becky KE6PZV to take over the duties of selecting a candidate for Member of the Year.
- **4. Field Day** Brian N6IIY reported that this years Field Day went very well. He has already reserved Youth Park for next June.
- **5. Mentoring** John WB6FRZ reported that 8 people have signed up for the Ham class on September 20-21. This number does not include possible CAP cadets which will be recruited at the PCAM show. John asked the Board for seed money to publish the manuals for the class. John will get this money back when the students submit their enrollment fees. The Board approved \$200 to purchase the course manuals.

Finding no one to rescue (and looking slightly disappointed, the family thought), the officials interviewed everyone, looked at the spot where Sarah had fallen and took some notes. Nick said the family was prepared to wait for a tow truck and didn't want to leave the RV and all their supplies behind. So, Sarah said, "Then everyone left and we spent the night on the side of the mountain." The first responding wrecker couldn't take both vehicles. It was the next day before Nick could contact his friend in 100 Mile again, who raised the Good Sam Club, which produced two tow trucks that took the family the more than 100 miles to Kamloops.

The family's troubles weren't over. The Heinecks came into town two days before July 1 — the Canada Day national holiday— so no one even looked at the truck until July 2. Then a landslide blocked a highway delaying the truck coming to deliver the new transmission. On Saturday, the family gave up waiting, got a rental car and drove to Golden, British Columbia, to finally get a look at the Canadian Rockies. Even after the truck was fixed, fate had one more twist in store: another blown tire on the way home. It could have been a better vacation, Kaynor said. Still, she said, "You know, the scariest part is just thinking what could have happened." "We finally made it back home and it could have been worse," Nick agreed. The transmission — his seventh — was \$6,000, he said, but "we are all hale and hearty. Sarah's scratches have healed, my fingers have healed and the truck seems to be working OK."

A ham radio operator since the late 1950s, Nick said the Canada call marked the first time he had to use the equipment to help his own family. "The amateur radio saved our bacon, really," he said. "It provided the communication when all else failed."
