### FCC Notice of Proposed Rule Making to Revise and Clarify Vanity Call Sign Rules Open for Comments (Jan 28, 2010) --

Late last year, the FCC issued a Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM) -- WT Docket 09-209 -- seeking to amend the Commission's Amateur Radio Service rules to clarify certain rules and codify existing procedures governing the vanity call sign system, as well as revise certain rules applicable to club stations. Interested parties may make comments on the NPRM in the following ways: via the Federal eRulemaking Portal or via the FCC's Web site. Comments must be submitted by March 26, 2010; reply comments are due no later than April 12, 2010.




### **SCRA Club Meetings**

While it may not happen often, there is always the chance that you may be required to work near a helicopter landing zone

during a disaster event. Take note of the following information to ensure your safety and that of those around you.

### Four Ws and Four Ss

Four Ws: Wind, Wires, Way In, Way Out. Four Ss: Size, Shape, Slope, Surface. These are the considerations that helicopter pilots mull over when deciding how and whether to land off-airport.

The helicopter should take off and land into the **wind** if possible, but never downwind. Helicopters fly more efficiently with a little bit of airspeed and if you take off into a 10-knot wind, you already have 10 knots of airspeed.

Wires and other obstacles are lethal to helicopter operations. The best landing zone is the center of a clear open field. A helicopter should not have to approach or depart over nearby wires. A Robinson helicopter needs to skim across the ground, with the skids between 5' and 10' over the surface, for about 100' before lifting higher.

Way In: Most folks think that helicopters take off and land straight up and down. Maybe they did at one time, but we live in an America that is increasing obese. When we're using helicopters and cranes to sling-load people who've grown too fat to fit through a door out of their apartments, the chance of getting a helicopter full of Americans straight up and down is remote. A normal approach in a helicopter is gliding down at a 10-degree angle. A steep approach is about 15 degrees. This means you need an area that is clear of obstacles, ideally the **size** of a football field unless the pilot is a hero and the helicopter is lightly loaded. The same consideration applies for the **way out**. The best **shape** for a landing zone, if you have several to choose amongst, is rectangular and oriented with the wind, i.e., a runway!

Helicopters can land on a **slope**, but it requires extra skill and entails some risk of dynamic rollover, which is a very common way to lose training helicopters. Try to pick an area that is flat. Dust, loose dirt, or snow on the **surface** is bad news; stuff that can blow around will blow around, possibly obscuring the pilot's vision once the helicopter comes to a hover. Paved is ideal. Grass is good.

### Where the landing zone should be

The actual landing zone, where the helicopter will set down after coming to a hover, need not be large. For a Robinson R44, think "four Honda Accords parked in a box". It should be in the center of the field and positioned so that people waiting for a ride or getting out of the helicopter have no reason to go near the tail. I.e., the front of the helicopter should be toward the terminal, building, picnic table, or whatever else is the focus of the gathering. **Make sure that nobody has any reason to walk past the tail of the helicopter for any reason; the natural flow should be from the helicopter forward.** 

### How to mark the landing zone

What **not** to use to mark a helicopter landing zone: Anything that can be blown around by the rotorwash or blown up into the tail. Rope is bad. Tape is bad. Lightweight cones or plastic lawn ornaments are bad.

A good way to mark the landing zone is with lime or paint. Heavyweight highway traffic cones may be used as well. Steal them from an Interstate Highway project; do not buy wimpy little ones that people might use to mark off a home driveway improvement project.

### Clean Up!

Walk at least 50' in every direction from the center of the landing zone, picking up trash and other loose debris.

### **Ground Handlers**

If you're evacuating or moving unfamiliar people, have at least one ground handler for each door. The ground handler approaches the helicopter alone and stands behind the door to guide the old rider out and prevent him or her from walking backwards toward the tail rotor. The old rider is guided away and instructed to duck a bit at the edge of the rotor disk. The new rider relieved of any hats or other loose items and then led by the arm to the helicopter. The new rider is placed in the seat, helped with the seat belt, and the (fragile) door closed for the new rider.

During all phases of the operation, including when the machine is shut down, keep the crowd away from the fragile tail rotor section and also from the fragile and expensive Plexiglass windows and bubble (people like to lean up against the helicopter with their synthetic clothing, especially for photos, and scratch the bubble).
