

For those that might be interested in our program for May is keys and oscillators. Code Interested hams should like this one, program that is; even new hams will like this month's program.


If you have any old, big or small or even hand made keys please bring them in to share with the club. See you at the May meeting!




SCRA Club Meetings

General and Extra Class Study Hall

Beginning on May 7th and continuing through July 30th for a total of ten Friday evenings, we will be meeting at the Santa Rosa Red Cross building on Aero Drive to study and discuss topics of interest and concern contained on the General and Extra Class examinations. This is an experiment, and is a compromise between full-blown courses for these license classes and no class at all. Specific topics will be chosen and published ahead of time so that everybody will know the topic of discussion for each meeting. But I want the students to tell us what areas they would like to discuss! So we will be taking inputs from all participants the first class on May 7th to establish the topics. We will be using the following textbooks:

ARRL General Class License Manual, Sixth Edition; and the ARRL Extra Class License Manual, Ninth Edition.

For May 7th, General Class participants should bring the manual, a list of topics that are giving you trouble and to be used as topics of discussion, and read pages 4-1 through 4-13 up to "Series and Parallel Circuits and Components."

For May 7th, Extra Class participants should bring the manual, a list of topics that are giving you trouble and to be used as topics of discussion, and read pages 5-1 through 5-13.

Explore the World at Field Day 2010 June 25, 26, 27

ALERT!! Field Day is only seven weeks away! We will again be having Field Day at the Youth Community Park (aka "the skateboard park"), 1725 Fulton Rd, in Santa Rosa (across the street from Piner High School). The theme this year is "Explore the World". As hams, the world is our playground, so what better place to have Field Day than in a public park. Field Day is one of our best opportunities to demonstrate amateur radio to the public.

Plans are coming together, but there are still lots to do in the next few weeks. we still need to tie up a few loose ends. We will be operating as a "2A" classification, meaning that we will have two HF transmitters. One of these will be on SSB and the other on CW. We need station captains and radios for both the SSB and CW stations, so if you can help us with this, please let me know. The SSB station will be in John, KE5RI's motor home. The CW station will again be in the SCRA communication van (the "Toaster").

We will also have a Get-On-The-Air, or GOTA, station. I encourage all of our recently-licensed hams and even those old-timers that have not had an opportunity to get on the HF bands in the last year to give the GOTA station a try. It will be operating on SSB and hopefully also PSK-31. We will need control operators (General or higher) to allow the unlicensed and under-licensed hams the ability to work HF. We get extra points if there is always a mentor at the GOTA station.

The GOTA station did an awesome job last year, and I would like to see it do even better this year.

There is also room for a VHF/UHF station. If you have a VHF and/or UHF rig that can operate FM, CW, and SSB, please bring it along. We would also like to try making a satellite contact. We were able to hear the satellite last year, but didn't get through.

Pat Coyle, KG6JSL, will be coordinating the dinner Saturday night. A donation of \$10 gets you both dinner Saturday night and breakfast Sunday morning. New this year will be a demonstration station. This station will primarily be used to show visitors what we can do with ham radio. Any contacts made on this station will not count.

We will also be having an Educational Activity. The exact time and content of this activity has not yet been determined, so watch for announcements on the SCRA website and your e-mail for further details.

We need your help!

First of all, I would like to hear from anyone who is hoping to participate in any way in Field Day this year. Even if you might only be there to observe for an hour or two to help logging, cooking, or whatever, please call me or send me an e-mail.

Specific areas where we need help are:

1. Radios for the SSB, CW and VHF/UHF stations

- 2. Station captains for the SSB, CW, GOTA, and UHF/VHF stations
- 3. Control operators for the GOTA station.
- 4. Laptop computers to use for logging.

5. Coax cable and UHF(f) to UHF(f) adapters. It's a real bummer when the station and antenna are separated by 120' and you only have 100' of coax! 7. "Tour Guides" to help show visitors around our Field Day site and explain what we are up to

We will begin setup around 4pm on Friday, June 25. We will try to get most of the antennas set up before sundown. Setup will continue Saturday morning, June 26. The event starts at 11:00am and runs until 11:00am Sunday morning, June 27. We will immediately start tearing down at 11:00am Sunday and should be leaving the park by 3:00pm.

Public Service Operating

We are now well into this year's public service events and all of us need to remember that Public Ser-

vice is one of the reasons the FCC has granted us the use of the many frequency bands we enjoy. Each and every one of us <u>OWES</u> it to our community to spend some time working these events; it's also good to remember that the donations from these events is mainly responsible for keeping our repeaters in top shape. If we all worked just one event each year there would be plenty of volunteers to ensure the success of every Public Service request we receive. Besides, it's a chance to get out in the sunshine, meet some new people, and practice your radio skills.

The following items are taken from the *ARRL Field Forum*; Volume 13 Number 2 by William L. Continelli, AB2CA:

Make sure your radio is in top operating condition.

Small problems (such as loose antenna connections, bad microphones, intermittent operation, etc.) may be just annoying during casual operation, but WILL cause major grief under the continuous/severe service of net/emergency operation.

Don't operate your handheld with it hanging on

your belt. Using the radio while it's strapped to your waist reduces your effective radiated power by more than 10 dB. That's a 90% reduction in power! Hold the radio in your hand with the antenna in the clear.

Regarding antennas, those 3" rubber dummy loads may be cute but you're throwing away 3-6 dB of power when using one. (If you're *really* into math, compute the loss of a 3" rubber dummy load used on a belt clip!) A telescoping half-wave has a gain of as much as 10dB over a 3" rubber duck and a quarter-wave provides a 4-6 dB improvement. Even a 12-15" rubber duck will boost your signal by 3-6 dB over the 3" ones. Remember that one dB can mean the difference in whether or not a critical message gets through.

Have charged batteries and spare battery packs! If you also have a dry cell battery case, fill it with alkaline batteries. Make sure you have enough batteries with you to carry you through the event, even on high power.

- Use headphones or an earphone rather than a speaker/ mike. Most earphones will plug directly into your HT. Low cost stereo headphones are widely available and will work perfectly with your HT using a mono-to-stereo adapter. The headphones also have the advantage of concentrating the communications in your ears while partially shutting out the outside noise. Headphones will also prolong battery life by allowing the radio to operate at lower audio output. A speaker/mike is the worst thing you can use – it doesn't cut the outside noise, it doesn't save batteries, and where is that HT while you're using the speaker/mike?? (Hint – see #2 above!)
- **Speak slowly and clearly** when transmitting! You may take pride in your ability to run your words together and mumble but the station on the other end may be in a noisy environment and may not be able to receive your message.
- **Check out your ability to use simplex.** Even if the operation is being conducted on a repeater, there may be "dead spots," the repeater may go down, or, sad to say, there may be jamming. Even if you can only work the two or three stations closest to you, a message can still be relayed. To maximize your simplex range, please re-read #2 and #3 above!
- Listen to net control and direct all communications through him/her. Identify your station when calling net control and keep all communications direct and to the point.
- If you must leave the radio or the area to which you have been assigned, first seek permission and acknowledgement from the net control station, make your "time off" as short as possible, and check back in with NCS immediately upon your return.
- **Project a good image** to the non-hams around you that are part of the event/emergency. This means acting professionally, dressing appropriately, using basic hygiene skills, etc.
- Above all else ... enjoy yourself! Working Public Service events is a rewarding experience and a fun way to give something back to the community.


