Public Service events allow us to exercise and improve our skills as radio operators while helping others. We are also improving our ability to set up ad-hoc nets that spread across remote areas of the county and beyond. We learn field expedient methods to maintain communications with each other and pass information that can potentially save lives. On top of that we help spread the word throughout the community about the benefits and services provided by SCRA.

The next time you look at a Public Service calendar consider that your participation will not only make you a better Ham, but will also prepare you for emergency operations in the event of a disaster, help the community, increase the community's awareness of SCRA and help you build a really cool t-shirt collection.

Mendocino Rally Report

This year's Mendocino Rally expanded to include two days of racing with 21 cars from 5 states, as far away as Colorado. We had a total of 21 hams over both days providing radio support. SCRA hams were joined by hams from the Mendocino County Amateur Radio Club, Lake County Amateur Radio Society, and "rally hams" who came from all over to join the fun.

Day One was July 20, 2013, on Walker Ridge Road, east of Clearlake, Ca. We provided 11 radio Blocks, which controlled access to the course and tracked the vehicles, in addition to hams as Start and Finish controls, and Sweep vehicles. Net Control was atop Walker Ridge with views east to the Sierras. Through out the day we were bothered by interference from a keying repeater as well as other users out in the valley, most of whom did not use their call sign, if they had one.

One interesting radio event of the day was a call to Net Control asking the location of a vehicle. We asked the caller for her tactical and FCC call for identification and was informed by the caller that she did not have an amateur license! The Rules regarding emergency use only by non-licensed operators, and the definintion of an emergency, were firmly explained and we heard no more from that user.

Stage One of Day one put our training, practice and experience immediately to the test, with 3 cars going missing off road, and one roll over. The training paid off as we were able to quickly identify and locate all cars, and dispatch assistance. There were no serious injuries, though some people were treated for heat related symptoms in the 100+ degree heat.

Day Two, July 21, 2013, was on the Cow Mountain Off Highway Vehicle Area, in the mountains east of Ukiah. Radio conditions were better on Sunday, with no interference, but some loss of reception in the late afternoon as atmospherics changed. Again, we had eleven Blocks plus controls and sweeps. Again our training and practice paid off when we had intruding vehicles enter the course literally seconds before the start of Stage 7. Quick and decisive action by Nick, KI6RIT and John, KG6PEP, averted what could have been a major catastrophy.

Stage 7 was the trophy round for the competitors. After 6 Stages and 80 miles of racing over two days, only seconds separated the leaders. The intensity of the event was noted by Nick, KI6RIT, who called in that the cars were going faster than ever before and that radio operators on the course should stay alert and stand back. The spirit of the competition was caught by Terry, KK6DQC, who reported one passage, with "Block 5, Car 541, Whoooeee."

I am extremely proud of the work all the ham operators did to make this a safe and successful event. Communications were uniformly clear, concise and accurate, kept the event going through some rough spots, and above all provided for the safety of all participants.

But don't take my word for how effective we were. This is an excerpt from the report of one of the event Stewards to Rally America, the national sanctioning body:

The communications team was outstanding and deserve their own "5" score. This group really has gotten good at understanding the intricacies and priorities of rally comms and are one of the rally's greatest assets and strengths.

The rally was an enjoyable event where we got to use our radio skills and had the best view of the competition on the course. As John, KG6EP, said, "Play a little radio, get a little dirty."

Next VE Session: Saturday, September 7

Our next VE exam is scheduled for Saturday, September 7, from 9am until noon. The location will be the Bennett Valley Grange Hall, 4145 Grange Road, Santa Rosa. Walk-ins will be accepted and all test elements will be administered. (http://www.sonomacountyradioamateurs.com/ve_testing.html).

Please arrive by 8:45am to be signed in. Testing will begin shortly thereafter.

Directions: From Hwy 101, take Highway 12 East to Farmers Lane. Turn right onto Farmers Lane and then left onto Bennett Valley Road. Stay on Bennett Valley Road approximately 4.1 miles and turn right onto Grange Road. Bennett Valley Grange Hall is 0.5 miles from Bennett Valley Road on the right.

Candidates should bring the following:

- One (1) photo ID or two (2) non-photo ID
- FCC Registration Number (FRN, if you have one) or Social Security Number (if you do not have an FRN) If you have had any FCC license assigned to you, amateur or otherwise, or had any prior business with the FCC, you probably have an FRN.
- Original and photocopy of your current amateur radio license (if licensed)
- Original and photocopy of any valid CSCEs (if applicable)
- #2 Pencil and eraser
- \$15.00 exam fee. Checks may be made payable to "ARRL-VEC"

Calculators may be used, but it must be demonstrated that all memories and programs have been erased. The calculator function in a cell phone or PDA may not be used!
