

**4wd Radio Sports** By KZ6T

In August John KG6PEP and myself went on a 4wd trip along the 395 corridor. Part of the program was to play a little radio as well. Here is an excerpt from a trip report, the balance of which you can read online at the mini-Dx website.

If you haven't been to this part of the State, I would highly encourage it as it is extremely scenic. The Owens valley is the corridor that U.S. Hwy 395 snakes through. The west side of the valley is bordered by the Sierras. No foothills here, the Sierras go straight up. The eastern edge is bordered by at least 3 different mountain ranges which are very different in composition than the Sierras. The Whites, Inyos, and Panamints.

The Whites are home to the Ancient Bristlecone Pines and the 2nd highest peak in the lower 48. The Inyos are home to many mines. The Panamints guard the North-western edge of Death Valley and are responsible for its dry climate.

A few of the attractions in the Valley include Mono Lake, Mammoth, the Owens River Valley, lots of hot springs, and a giant volcano caldera that if (and when) it goes will be an Earth altering event. Towns along 395 include Bridgeport, Lee Vining, Mammoth Lakes, Bishop, Big Pine, Independence, and Lone Pine. Each has its odd distinctions. Bridgeport has the highest gasoline prices in the State. Manzanar a WWII internment camp is near Independence (how ironic), and Lone Pine with its odd rock formations is where hundreds of Hollywood films were made.

#### **Battleship vs. QRP** Dave W6IBC

The latest issue of CQ Magazine describes the efforts of several retired Naval admirals to create so-called "battleship" ham radio stations for the purpose of "destroying" competitors during contests and dx pileups. With no disrespect intended for our distinguished military leaders, I question whether ham radio's best interests are advanced by likening legal limit stations feeding their massive firepower signals through stacked multielement arrays mounted atop 200 foot towers? What kind of satisfaction can possibly ensue from overpowering one's competitors with such powerful resources generally available only to a very select few hams? Certainly, contest awards and recognition in ham radio publications and lists, along with photographs, are certain consequences. Yet, ham radio provides other opportunities for personal operating achievement.

Take QRP operation, for example. Recently, on a vacation to the west coast town of Kona on the Big Island of Hawaii, I strung out a 20 meter dipole our vacation condo's balcony, connected it to my Yaesu FT-817; October 2013

and with it's powerful TWO-watt signal, caught Terry, VK4HQ, net control of the ANZA DX Net on 20- meter SSB net. Terry gave me a five-by-four signal report. It was a highly personally rewarding contact. I encourage all hams to turn down the power and try low power (QRP) operation.
